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INTRODUCTION

This family history and genealogy was prepared to show what we have discovered about our sturdy ancestors. It is an attempt to provide our children with the raw material to better visualize from whence we came. Most family histories start with one ancestor and come forward generation by generation expanding as they approach the present. This book is the reverse. It starts with the author and goes back generation by generation providing what information is available from the present until the line disappears from lack of knowledge. In a few cases families are traced beyond our shores to some part of the Old World. However, the primary thrust was to trace each line back to the IMMIGRANT.

The title itself is an attempt to show what we have achieved because we stand on the shoulders of those giants--Our Ancestors. Sir. Isaac Newton when congratulated on some of his discoveries wrote to Robert Hooke, 5 February 1675/6, "If I have seen further it is by standing <u>upon the shoulders</u> <u>of giants.</u>" It is from this statement the title of the book is derived.

Most of the information in this book was secured from personal library and courthouse research. However, I have secured help from friends and relatives, many are distant cousins and were complete strangers when this research started three years ago. The references at the end of each chapter indicate the source of my information and the titles of the most frequently used reference books are collected in the Bibliography in the Appendix.

NUMBERING SYSTEM

The numbering system used is based on the relationship of each ancestor to the author. He is number, 1; his father, 2; his mother, 3; paternal grandfather, 4; paternal grandmother, 5; maternal grandfather, 6; and his wife, 7. The male member of each preceeding generation doubles the number of his son and his wife adds one. Her father is double her number and her mother adds one, ad infinitum. The children of each chapter are indicated by the number to the right of the first decimal point. The grandchildren are indicated by their number to the right of the second decimal point, and the great-grandchildren are indicated to the right of the third decimal point. This example illustrates the system. In Chapter 15 we have John Hahn, 30.0 and his wife if known would be 31.0.

30.3.2.3 George Washington Hahn, John Ezra's 3rd child In this chapter my great-grandmother, Lydia Hahn, number 15 as derived from me is also listed as 30.5 since she is the fifth child of John Hahn. She is described in detail in Chapter 8 where she is 15.0 with her husband 14.0 and her children 14.x.

When the husband had more than one wife, an "X" was added to the number of the first wife, a "Y" was added to the number of the second wife, and a "Z" was added to the number of the third wife. In the case of BENJAMIN STEPHENS, 54.0, his first wife, MIRIAM, is 55.0X; CATHERINE is 55.0Y; and FRANCES is 55.0Z.

CHAPTER 1

VERNON ARTHUR ZEITLER AND THELMA LEONE POORBAUGH

MY parents, LYDIA BEOLIA McFEATERS and HARRY ARTHUR ZEITLER, were married 29 November 1911 in the WILLIAM C. McFEATERS home 700 Wayne Avenue, Indiana, PA. The first few years they spent in Reynoldsville, PA. and moved to Fourth Street Indiana, PA prior to my birth 6 May 1917. My father was the foreman of the plumbing shop of A. T. Taylor & Son He had a large garden and raised chickens while living at that address.

When I was about three years old we moved into our own home at 451 Philadelphia Street. The house was more than 100 years old at that time and had previously been the home of Squire McLain. It consisted of three rooms down and three rooms and bath upstairs with a partially excavated cellar. The large kitchen was my playroom during those early years. Since it was heated by my mother's gas cook stove I rode MY tricycle around the kitchen table, had a work table in the corner where I could saw boards, hammer nails and paint or do most anything for my own amusement. My father gave me my own tool chest and supplied full size tools for my own use. Some were tools that he had worn out in his work but they were mine and hence I did not use his tools.

Our dining room was the only other room in the house that was heated continuously during the winter months. Each fall we rolled the coal stove in from the corner of the kitchen, gave it a coat of black stove polish, added the smoke pipe and fired it up with bituminous coal. Our living room had a small gas stove which was only lighted when we had company in the parlor or when I had to practice the piano during those three years that I suffered through piano lessons. By the same token the coal stove was returned to the kitchen under wraps during the summer. Some time in the late twenties we had electricity installed in the house. Previously we used natural gas lights with Wellsbach mantles. Our bedroom was directly above the dining room and heat came through a small register from the coal stove directly underneath. the stove was banked each night to preserve the fire.

The house was directly adjacent to the house west of ours which was owned by ARAMINTHA GABLE, a maiden lady, who was the chief inspector at the Indiana Glass Works and a wonderful kind and generous neighbor. To the east was a three foot wide brick passage way between our house and a red brick house of the Edwards family.

My grandfather, WILLIAM C. McFEATERS, lived alone three years after the death of my grandmother, LEAH ANN MOORHEAD. She was affectionately known as ANNIE by most people but she was always referred to as "MUZ" by my grandfather. In 1929 grandfather made a partial division of his estate to MY NIV mother, my aunt, CORA CAMERON, and LOWRY K. McFEATERS, three of his remaining children. CORA CAMERON received her home which he had built for her on the back end of his lot, ΜV mother received the family home at 700 Wayne Avenue. She was to provide a home for my grandfather for the remainder of CORA and LOWRY were to receive the eight rent his life. houses located in a suburb of Johnstown, PA. My grandfather received the rents for the remainder of his life.

My companions in this neighborhood were usually RALPH MODRHEAD, not related, EDDIE WOLF and BILL COOPER. We had the Park across Wayne Avenue from my home for football and the use of a vacant lot across Washington Street from my aunt's home for softball, our own miniature golf course and other activities. There were more girls than boys in the neighborhood. The ones most frequently available for playmates were ALICE and EDNA QUINN and PEGGY and BARBARA PRO-THERO.

fall of 1930 I entered the Junior High School In the which was located on North Fifth Street in the same building as the Senior High School. My first six years of school had been at the East End Elementary School on South Fifth Street between School and Washington Streets. Graduation from High School was in the class of 1935. Scholastically my prades were good enough to gain fifth place in a class of 216. The four ahead of me were all girls and three of them went to Indiana State Teachers College with me. This was in the heart of the Depression and there was no possibility of mγ going away to college. Therefore I enrolled in the fall of 1935 in Secondary Education with majors in mathematics and physical science with the desire to become a chemist.

The closing of the banks had a dramatic effect on our lives. My grandfather could not understand that he could not get any of his money from the bank and his renters in most cases could not pay their rents. He went from a wealthy man to a pauper in one stroke. Our only income was my father's wages which were reduced 15 percent at the same time. My grandfather who normally spent his winters in Florida was forced now to stay in Pennsylvania. These blows forced him into early senility.

College was very enjoyable. My grades were very good and I found enough time for extra-curricular activities such as class officer several times, member of the student council, several three act plays, editor of the yearbook and membership in a social fraternity plus membership in two honorary fraternities, viz, Kappa Delta Pi and Alpha Phi Gamma. When I graduated in 1939 the Depression was still on and there were not very many teaching positions open. I secured a job teaching mathematics in the Robinson Township Junior High School, Allegheny County, PA, at \$1125. per year. The school was located at Moon Run adjacent to what after World War II became the Greater Pittsburgh Airport. My second year at Robinson Township I had the additional duties of Building Principal with a \$5.00 per month increase in salary.

While at Robinson Township I entered the Graduate School at the University of Pittsburgh with deficiencies in Chemistry since Indiana gave only one semester of Organic one semester of Physical Chemistry. To remove these and deficiencies I enrolled at the University of Colorado for the summer quarters of 1940 and 1941. When I returned from Colorado in 1941 Dr. Uhler recommended me for a position at Tyrone, PA. I was hired to teach chemistry, physics and Vocational Science courses. There I joined a group of young, single teachers. On weekends after the local football or basketball games, where we worked, we got together for parties. Usually this consisted of each preparing his specialty and having a dutch treat dinner at the home of BETTY SMITH and JANE LUCAS. Others in the group were WILLARD KERR, ROBERT BLOOM and THELMA POORBAUGH. Out of this group four of us went on to secure doctorates.

THELMA and I became secretly engaged in October 1941 which we announced at the group's first dinner meeting after the bombing of Pearl Harbor, 7 December 1941. We ordered our wedding rings and her engagement ring on time payments. Mr. NORMAN MILLER, the Superintendant of Schools, arranged with the School Board so that THELMA and I could get married and each retain his job. During the Depression the School Board did not permit two members of a family to be employed in their district. We located two partially furnished rooms with Mrs MANN and were married on Saturday, 14 February 1942. The schools were closed Monday, 16 Feb 1942 and the teachers of the School District were to serve as rationing board assistants for one of the early rationing periods for tires, gasoline or sugar. We were excused so that we could have a short honeymoon. ARTHUR POORBAUGH was my best man, BETTY REBERT was maid of honor, WILLARD KERR and BOB BLOOM served as ushers. We were married in the morning at the Methodist Church of Tyrone where we both taught Sunday School. After a bridal dinner at the American Legion Home we left on our honeymoon. In the meantime JANE LUCAS, BETTY SMITH and others had decorated my little 1932 Dodge Coupe which I had purchased in the fall of 1940 from a country Doctor who had put about 150,000 miles on that poor thing. We spent that night at the Fort Bedford Inn and the second night at the home of THELMA's grandparents, the GEORGE WASHINGTON WITT's in Wellersburg. When we returned we were broke and needed credit to get groceries until payday.

THELMA and I were involved in community activities including my attempt to serve as the instructor for the Civil Defense Board. I enlisted in the Army Air Corps in Aug 1942 and that fall we found an apartment of our own consisting of four rooms and bath. The rooms all opened onto a hall which was part of our apartment but served as access to the couple living in the apartment on the third floor. We purchased our own furniture and having sold my car in the summer we were forced to use the train from Tyrone to Torrance, PA and thence by bus to Indiana or to depend upon my father for transportation when we went to visit my parents.

I was called to active duty in March 1943 and sent to the Classification Center at Nashville, TN. In late April those aviation Cadets designated for Navigation School were shipped to Selman Field, Monroe, LA. THELMA visited me in June just before my Preflight Navigation Class was transferred to an Aerial Gunnery School at Tyndall Field, Panama City, Fl. When my class completed Gunnery School we were transferred back to the Advanced Navigation School at Selman Field. We completed our training and were commissioned 2nd Lieutenants in the Army Air Corps at one Minute after midnight 24 December 1943 and released on two weeks leave. THELMA had completed three years of teaching and secured her permanent teaching certificate in early December and was able to spend the last week with me at Selman Field. We rode a troop train to St. Louis and managed to get to the home of my parents on the morning of Christmas. I was reassigned as a Navigational Instructor and reported back to Selman Field in early January 1944. After instructing one class through the school, two other 2nd Lt. Navigators and I were assigned to the Air Sea Rescue School at Keesler Field, Biloxi, MS. We were crewed with pilots, engineers and radio men for crew training on OA-10 (PBY-6A) aircraft and designated as Air Transport Command Air Sea Rescue crews. This permitted us to complete our training in a minimum of time. We were shipped to Nashville and from there to Memphis, 4th Ferrying Group to deliver aircraft while awaiting for our own PBY's to arrive. After making two ferry trips, one to Marrakech and Casa Blanca, the other to Stanstead, England, I was recalled from West Palm Beach while on a third trip with an A-26 and transferred to Mather Field, Sacramento CA. When leaving each base we received a short leave to take our wives home and settle them but within a week after arriving at our new base and finding that we were not immediately leaving for overseas the wives drifted back to join us.

Finally in February 1945 the PBY's arrived. My crew consisting of MARCUS WEST, pilot; MILTON MODRE, co-pilot; PHIL SCHWARZ, engineer; BILL TURNER, radio man and LELAND FRYSINGER, radar; and the crew of HUDSON ROSE were briefed for immediate take-off. Both planes had troubles and returned to base. We were able to repair our plane, No. 4011, and we arrived at the 1522nd Air Base Unit on Dahu the next afternoon after a seventeen hour flight and about 36 hours without sleep. Incidently we had a crew reunion by phone in April 1985 the first contact for me with the crew in 40 years.

The next day we started work as an Air Sea Rescue crew after four or five days flying each day one-half and way back to the States we were transferred to Kwajalein in the Marshall Islands to aid in the search for the Commanding General of the Twentieth Air Force whose plane had disappeared the night of our departure from California. We were under orders from the Navy, drawing rations and quarters from the Army Air Corps and getting maintainence from the Marine Corps. After several days of fruitless searching on our final day we landed in Bikini Atoll and almost sank our plane in the lagoon when the tail-gunner hatch popped open and we took on a lot of water until PHIL SCHWARZ managed to cram it shut. On our return to Kwajalein we were assigned to Majuro Atoll to search for a Marine pilot who had been in the water several days after being shot down by the Japs on Wotje Atoll. After a few days we were reassigned to Dahu and there we were given our permanent assignment to the 1522nd Base Unit on Honolulu Naval Air Station. We had secondary duties on the Army Air Corps Base but were under flvino orders from the Hawaiian Sea Frontier. In October 1945 after the surrender of the Japanese I was assigned to the Central Pacific Wing as Wing Navigation and Briefing Officer. By December the Wing was dissolved and I was reassigned to the Hickam Field Base Unit where I remained as Navigation and Briefing Officer until May 1947. THELMA was able to join me in February 1946 in time for our anniversary.

As briefing officer it was necessary for me to fly over the routes which I briefed and this meant frequent trips to Guam and Kwajalein, and one memorable trip to California in December 1945 with a war-weary B-29 loaded with officers, airmen and nurses going back for discharge. We arrived in San Francisco New Years Eve and I was so tired from the long day that I went to bed without celebrating. The next day I wrangled and arranged a trip to Washington, DC and home for a short leave with my parents and to help THELMA get ready for her trip to Hawaii.

Our first son, ARTHUR, was born 19 Dec 1946 at Tripler General Hospital, Fort Shafter, Oahu on the day that I was Officer of the Day. We waited for a Regular Army Commission until I was finally shipped home 1 May 1947 for discharge. We were transferred from the San Francisco Bay Area Discharge Center to Carlisle Barracks, PA and arrived in Pittsburgh 12 May 1947. We were met by THELMA's family and driven straight to the Indiana Hospital. We arrived just in time to see my father breath his last without ever seeing his grandson.

I was discharged from active duty with the rank of Captain. In 1957 I was promoted to Major in the Air Force Reserve and finally discharged in 1961 just before my 20th anniversary.

Dr. JOSEPH UHLER offered me a position with the Indiana State Teachers College in the Science Department. I resigned my position with the Tyrone Public Schools System, turned down my Regular Commission in the Army Air Corps as a First Lieutenant, and re-entered the Graduate School at the University of Pittsburgh to complete a Masters degree.

In October 1948 our second son, ERIC RALPH ZEITLER, was born in the Indiana Hospital. Our growing family needed more room and we purchased a home at 1425 Washington Street, Indiana, PA with a large fenced yard and a large garden. We settled in to make do on an Instructor's salary. It was here that my childhood desire for an electric train was really fulfilled when Santa with my help built an elaborate lay-out and added facilities for two small boys and one large Zeitler boy. This lay-out moved with us many times and finally became large enough to fill an attic at our second home in Lake Jackson, TX.

From September 1947 until June 1950 I taught the regular term at Indiana State Teachers College and spent each summer at the University of Pittsburgh taking whatever courses I could that would help complete the degree. In the fall of 1949 it became necessary to take evening courses at the University and finally in June 1950 I received the degree, Master of Letters with a major in Chemistry and a minor in Physics. That summer I taught at Indiana and the following summer at Edinboro State Teachers College.

Part of my teaching load at Indiana consisted of Physical Science Courses, first year Chemistry and an occassional advanced chemistry course. However, in June 1951 it became necessary for me to be entered in the University of choice and in the degree program of choice or lose my GI Bill entitlement. Hence that summer while teaching at Edinboro I entered Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio with plans to complete a doctoral program of studies with a major in inorganic chemistry. This meant commuting two nights each week from Edinboro to Cleveland to take one course, but this was sufficient to meet the requirements.

I spent the summer of 1952 in Cleveland and met my research advisor, Dr. CHARLES BROWN who had recently joined the staff. It became obvious that I would not be able to complete the program by just going summer sessions. THELMA and I made the decision that I would ask for a leave of absence and attend full time starting in June 1953 for fifteen months. This would permit me to get the required courses to prepare for the written qualifying examinations.

The leave of absence without pay was granted by Dr. PRATT, President of the College. During the Easter vacation, Leonard Hall, the classroom building where my chemistry laboratory and office were located burned to the ground. We struggled to make ends meet for class room purposes and temporarily moved into a small building for instructional purposes for the remainder of the term. In June I returned to Western Reserve and started my research work. I managed get home every other weekend leaving Friday night toand returning Sunday night. During the summer this permitted me to cultivate my large garden and take care of the lawr. THELMA was left the care of our two small sons: ARTHUR and ERIC, six years and four years old respectively. During the spring term while studying for the written exams I discoverd a large swelling in my neck which was diagnosed as a fetal adnoma of the thyroid. In June the day after my sister-in-MARLENE POORBAUGH's wedding to EDWARD TEICHERT I enlaw. tered the Indiana Hospital and had surgery on the thyroid. I returned to Western Reserve without missing any class time. My research was going well and there seemed a good possibility that it would be supported by a grant from the Bureau of Naval Research. I requested an extension of my leave of absence but Indiana State Teachers College refused my request. With the assistance of the head of the Science Department, Dr. DWIGHT SOLLBERGER, I managed to schedule MY entire teaching load into four days and thus could spend Friday through Sunday at Western Reserve doing research. I had passed my gualifying exams and with the credits I transferred would not be required to take any more course work in the winter term. During my previous year I had been in charge of the freshman chemistry laboratories but now I was being supported by a grant from the Bureau of Naval Research and although not receiving subsistance under the GI Bill my tuition was paid by that Bill. My work continued through the summer and in the fall of 1955 I again managed to schedule my teaching load at Indiana so that I could continue tocommute to Cleveland.

After giving a talk on my research at the American Chemical Society meeting in Minneapolis, MN in September my research advisor told me to start writing my thesis and wind-up my research. By Thanksgiving my research was almost finished and the thesis nearing completion. In December I stood for the Oral Examination successfully and the long hard road was finished. I received my Ph. D. at the February Graduation but was unable to attend because of the horrible weather.

That spring it became obvious that instead of teaching

more chemistry courses for which I had worked long and hard to prepare I would be teaching fewer chemistry courses arid more Physical Science courses to non-majors. THELMA and I decided to look for a position in the Sun Belt states. There were no offers from any of the Universities that I contacted but my application to the Texas Division. Dow Chemical Company brought an offer of an interview in Freeport,TX and after a successful interview an offer of a JOD in the Central Analytical Laboratories under Dr. EDWARD I resigned at Indiana and we planned our move to WRIGHT. Texas for the first of June 1956.

Dur furniture left before Memorial Day and I drove to Freeport while THELMA and the boys flew. We met at the KARL POORBAUGH's in Memphis and stayed overnight. I arrived in Freeport on a Saturday night, unloaded my new station wagon the next day drove to Houston to pick-up my family at and JOHN TOWNSEND's where they had spent the night. THELMA the I had been good friends with JOHN and FRANCES TOWNSEND and in Monroe, LA at Selman Field. They had gone back to Kansas after the war and we to Pennsylvania but now we end up only sixty miles from each other in Texas.

We lived in a rent house in Freeport from June until August when we managed to sell our house in Indiana and purchase a home in Lake Jackson, TX. This house at 204 Carnation Street was on the edge of the city just as our home at 1425 Washington Street had been at the edge of Indiana, PA. In September our third son, KURT VERNON ZEIT-LER, was born.

ARTHUR was enrolled in the fifth grade at the Elementary School on Circle Way and ERIC in the third grade in temporary quarters in the First Methodist Church on Azalea Street. The next year they were both in the Lake Jackson Junior High School and Elementary School on Circle Way until the A. P. Beutel School, two blocks from our house, opened and they were transferred to this new building.

We became involved in Scouting the first fall because ARTHUR had been a Cub Scout in Indiana and his mother had been a Den Mother. As soon as ERIC could become a Cub Scout and both boys involved, Dad became the Webelos Leader. Later when KURT was able to enter Cub Scouting THELMA again became a Den Mother. When ARTHUR and ERIC were both enrolled in Boy Scouting I became involved as an Assistant Scout Master and later became the Scout Master of Troop 325 sponsored by the Methodist Church. This was a camping troop and we First camped one weekend a month no matter what the weather gave Both ARTHUR and ERIC became Eagle Scouts and ARTHUR us. earned the God and Country Award. ARTHUR went on to become an Explorer Scout and Eric became a Junior Assistant Scout Master. Both boys were Senior Patrol Leader for a year. They went to Philmont Scout Ranch with me in June 1961. Here ARTHUR was able to make the mountain hike, ERIC being too young was unable to participate in the hike. ARTHUR went to the NATIONAL JAMBOREE at Colorado Springs in 1960, the 50th Anuiversary of Scouting in America. ERIC attended the National Jamboree in 1964 at Valley Forge.

In July 1961 THELMA finally achieved her goal and gave birth to a little girl, KARLENE BEOLIA ZEITLER. Within six weeks we were forced to flee the ravages of Hurricane Carla and spent six anxious days in San Antonio until we could return home to find little damage to our house but severe damage to the plants and my laboratory. The seven of us: three adults and four children including the new baby girl lived in an apartment which we rented at a motel whose manager was a friend of KARL POORBAUGH's father-in-law, KEMPER MCHANEY.

In 1957 we built an addition to our house, a mother-inlaw apartment. In the summer of 1958 my mother sold her home at 700 Wayne Avenue and moved to Texas. She shared our life until her death in 1965. We did not take very extensive vacation trips as a family in those early years. The trip back to PA to show off our third son in 1957, a trip to Matamoras, Loredo and San Antonio in 1959 were the longest trips until 1961. That year in June ARTHUR, ERIC and I went to Philmont Scout Ranch and in September we fled the hurri-In 1962 we made an extensive trip to Disney Land and cane. visited Yosemite, Bryce Canyon, Zion and the Grand Canyon. Again in 1962 we made a trip at Christmas time to be with RALPH and NETTIE POORBAUGH in West Palm Beach, FL. The next family trip was in the summer of 1965 when we took BEOLIA'S ashes back to Pennsylvania to bury them beside HARRY in. Dakland Cemetery. We went on to visit the TOMB's in Corning, NY and on to Niagara Falls. This was followed by a trip to the Thousand Islands and then to New York City for the World's Fair. We visited the TEICHERT's in Chester, NJ and then home by way of the Eastern Shore of Maryland, Yorktown, Jamestown and Duke University where ARTHUR was considering Duke Law School. We did visit Washington, DC on this trip on our way north.

Our previous visit in 1957 had been all too brief. This time we were prepared and ARTHUR was very interested in the way the Senate and House carried on the affairs of the government. This we had not had time to explore in 1957. THELMA made several trips back to Hood College with stops in Washington and visits to her family in Somerset, PA over the years. On one trip she took ERIC and KURT along by plane. On another trip she drove and had KARLENE and KURT along. On this last trip KURT was not old enough to help with the driving but he could help his mother find the way. One other trip was made by THELMA and KARLENE by bus for experience and that really was an experience.

My career at Dow went like this. In 1957 I took charge of the Mass Spectrometry section and in 1959 the Infrared section was added. By 1962 I became Group Leader with responsibility for mass spectrometry, infrared spectroscopy, nuclear magnetic resonance spectrometry and gas chromatography in a molecular spectroscopy laboratory. I maintained this group through moves from Plant A to Plant B and finally to the Research Center in 1969. About 1973 a promotion to Associate Scientist capped my career although my laboratory was expanded to include liquid chromatography. In 1981 approaching an age when we must give up line responsibility I transferred to Urethanes Research Laboratory where I remained until I retired 1 May 1982 and became 65 years old the same week.

THELMA's interest in genealogy aroused my interest. My desire to join the Sons of the American Revolution was achieved in July 1983 when I was able to become a member of the Paul Carrington Chapter, Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution. In the next eighteen months I transferred to the Cradle of Texas Chapter as a charter member and Secretary-Treasurer, and added additional patriots. THELMA successfully recruited ERIC, KURT and three other new members and was recognized at our first State Conference with a Medal of Recognition. Since then I have been elected President of this chapter.

During these three years since retirement THELMA and I have travelled more than sixty thousand miles in our Prowler Travel Trailer, twice to the west coast and five times to the east coast plus a long trip through the Rocky Mountains as far north as Banff. Lake Louise and Jasper. We returned through Idaho, eastern Washington and Dregon to Salt Lake City. On this trip we pulled the trailer with the Oldsmobile sedan but all of the later trips were made using the GMC pick-up which we purchased with the proceeds from my GI insurance policy which the Veterans Administration insisted on paying off in the fall of 1982, thirty-five years after discharge.

KURT and KARLENE became involved in athletics and THEL-MA and VERNON followed them from game to game. KARLENE was introduced to softball at age eight and played catcher from then on. In 1972 her team did well enough in the State Tournament to go to the National Tournament in Kansas City. The girls earned enough and solicited enough money to pay transportation and food for the trip. We went in a pick-up, a station wagon, our small Maverick and the PERRY MUELLER's motor home. In Kansas City we lived in the home of a brother of Mr. Leroy Linder of Lake Jackson. The girl's won a few games but were finally eliminated. However, they were sixth

in the tournament. Three years later the same group of girls won the State Championship of Texas at the State Tournament in Victoria, Texas. KARLENE played left field in that tourand made a spectacular diving one-handed catch of an nament impossible fly ball. She then got up and threw to first to double a runner who had gone beyond second before KARLENE's For this play she was awarded an outstanding catch. player In her career she earned trophies in three State trophy. Tournaments: one as catcher, one at first base and this for outfielder. This time the girls raised enough money so that were able to rent a Kerrville Bus to go to Binghamton, We THELMA, KURT and I went as paying passengers. Again the NY. won the first two or three games but were finally girls eliminated. Again they came in sixth. KARLENE had an outstanding batting average and placed second or third behind the batting champ who was from the Dallas area.

KURT became interested in football in eighth grade. He started every game and played both ways. The next year was same story and his ninth grade team had an outstanding the season of ten games. In spring training he made the varsity and played three years on the third, fourth and fifth varsity teams of Brazoswood High School. His sophomore year they went into the play-offs and were finally eliminated by San Antonio Lee when TOMMY KRAMER connected in the final seconds with his end to defeat us. His junior year they were 9-0-1. game was decided by penetrations and Brazosport The final on but lost their first play-off game. KURT's senior werit was marred only by a loss in a non-district game to year Lufkin. They won district, bi-district in a game marred with a five-inch rainfall but triumphed over Austin Reagan. They crushed McAllen on a cold day in Corpus Christi. They WOW big over San Antonio Winston Churchill and narrowly defeated Port Neches-Grove in the Astrodome. The final game on the Saturday before Christmas 1974 was in Memorial Statium iri The entire ZEITLER family was there and Brazoswood Austin. defeated Mesquite for the State AAAA Championship. We had two rooms in the Holiday Inn Motel. ARTHUR, ERIC, KURT and I shared one room while THELMA, CAROL, SUZANNE, KARLENE and SANDRA WHITEHEAD slept in the other. Thus in less than twelve months KURT and KARLENE were each on State Championship teams in their respective sports. The entire family supported the football team at several games during these three years.

Over the years we have been very fortunate that our children all survived. ARTHUR was severely injured when he fell from the door of our moving car and the large door closed on his body. After laying in the hospital all day in shock our friend and former neighbor Dr. TIM KREDLE saw us standing in the hall and when he found out the problem took over the case and in a short time had a diagnosis. A specialist came out over icy highways from Pittsburgh that night and removed the kidney whose artery had been severed by the blow. ARTHUR recovered and went on to lead a normal healthy life. He played Little League ball and Teen Age ball. ERIC when a freshman at Texas Teck University was struck while riding his motor bike and had his right knee cap shattered by the blow. The surgery was carried out immediately and when I arrived in Lubbock the next morning I found a very badly injured young son. He rehabilitated his leg by exercise and is not too badly handicapped with this disability. KURT broke bones in his feet while playing football in eighth grade, his nose in high school and suffered a deep bruise in the arm where a calcium deposit was removed surgically. KARLENE suffered a broken hand her senior year in softball and was out a good portion of the season.

On our trip to Hawaii, given us by ARTHUR and CARDL for our fortieth anniversary, in April 1982 just prior to my retirement, THELMA spotted a replica of the Liberty Bell at the Capitol in Honolulu. She had seen another in Boston in 1976. When we found a third in Salt Lake City in October she really became interested in the multiplicity of these replicas and thus our second big hobby was born. We have visited about 36 of the sites photographing and recording the serial numbers of each replica bell where possible. Some of the replica bells are located so that it is extremely difficult to get high enough to see or photograph the serial number. THELMA prepared a program on this subject which was accepted by both the Daughters of the American Revolution and the Daughters of the American Colonists. We prepared a selected group of slides which we used when presenting the program.

At the present time we have two grandchildren and one married child, ARTHUR. In 1971 he married CAROL ANN JARVIS WIGHT who had a daughter, SUZANNE. In 1976 they adopted our grandson, KEVIN ARTHUR ZEITLER, born 13 August 1976.

CHAPTER 2

HARRY ARTHUR ZEITLER AND LYDIA BEOLIA MEFEATERS

My father, HARRY ARTHUR ZEITLER, was the third child born to JOHN and LAURA ZEITLER at O'Donnel's Mills in Winslow Township, Jefferson County, PA. My father was the second son and evidently quite close to his father throughout his life. I remember my father telling of helping his father make sausage, go squirrel hunting with the muzzelloading rifle which he inherited and target practice with that rifle. The rifle had been shortened six inches because my grandfather was not very tall.

The family was not very affluent and their decision to send the oldest son to business college was based on the idea that his first job would help educate the next child. However, WILLIS got married and my dad had to drop out of school and work to help support the family. I am not certain how far he went in his formal education but in later life he had the confidence of his employer to the extent that he figured plumbing and heating jobs so that competent bids could be placed and won. He did not write many letters but his handwriting was very good and easy to read.

Apparently HARRY as a boy worked in a glass works as an assistant to the glass blowers and gathered the hot glass for them. The paper weight that one glass blower made for him is still on my desk, a momento of my father. When he was about 16 years old he was an apprentice plumber. Around the turn of the century he left home and worked for awhile in Homestead PA in the Edgar Thompson Works, a steel mill, as a pipe-fitter.

am not certain when he first came to Indiana but I he roomed and boarded on Water Street in the 1900 census and was employed by A. T. Taylor & Son. He had a coin collection which although not large had many sentimental pieces which he had aguired including a penny which had been run over by the funeral train of President McKinley. This collection was one of the things stolen when our house was robbed in 1939. My father was a very calm person who could take adversity better than anyone I have ever seen. He did not blow-up and at the robbers. He swollowed his loss and went rail ori The small white pennies and the early copper Indian living. head pennies were in my collection mounted on the wall and that is the only part of his collection which survived.

My father had become a self-taught photographer who could make exceptionally good pictures. He had an old camera which used glass negatives. Some of his pictures are still in the album that my parents left me and they were very good. He evidently traded that for a roll-film camera which took post-card sized pictures. In my youth I stripped the negatives from the glass in order to used the small glass plates to frame my penny collection. None of his negatives survived. He enjoyed reading and smoked a pice, cigarettes and on special occasions a cigar. In his bachelor room he had accumulated souvenirs for his walls such as an opium pipe, a chinese flute, an Austrian clay pipe and Gibson Girl posters.

HARRY was an excellent dancer and skater. He met NV mother at either a skating rink or at a dance in "Old Library Hall" in Indiana. Although he left Indiana and went towork in Reynoldsville, PA the romance blossomed and he married LYDIA BEOLIA McFEATERS 29 November 1911 in her father's home and took his bride to Reynoldsville to live. I believe that the living conditions were not good because she often remarked that my father had to beat the ice from the crack of the kitcher door with a hammer in order to get to work on cold winter mornings. I assume that her parents helped them to some extent. They returned to Indiana around 1915 and lived in a rented house on North Fourth Street. HARRY was again employed by A. T. Taylor & Son in the plumbing and heating shop.

HARRY was 36 years old when I was born 6 May 1917 and he had to register for the draft although he was never called to active duty. At this location he had a large garden, raised chickens for eggs and meat to feed his family. LYDIA BEOLIA was 30 years old at my birth.

About 1920 my grandfather, WILLIAM C. McFEATERS, aided my parents in purchasing the home at 451 Philadelphia Street. Here my father again gardened and raised chickens. He always spaded his garden with either a long handle shovel or a garden fork. It was hard work but he was young and strong.

He had the dug-well cleaned and installed a new pitcher pump. Although we had city water it was not nearly as good as the sweet water from this well which we used except during the winter. The attic of the house was loaded with what would now be expensive antiques. I remember my mother telling about the number of spool beds and other pieces of furniture he carried to the back of the lot and burned. He fenced the yard and constructed flower beds which he helped my mother plant with a variety of bulbs and flowers. About one-half of the lot was in grass which he religiously mowed and kept neat. When I was about 5 years old he erected two swings with 24 foot 4 x 4 posts with about 18 foot ropes. He would push me on the swing until the ropes extended parallel to the ground.

During these years he essentially helped raise my cou-

ROBERT and HELEN CAMERON. He was a favorite uncle. He sins, helped BOB construct an early radio. Dad did the soldering. Unfortunately he used acid flux and he should have used rosin. Eventually they got it to work and it even could speaker. BOB and HELEN were living operate a with their mother in the home of our grandfather. not widowed He did kindly to radio. Thus the radio was constructed take and at our house for a couple of years. Dad put used up ari antenna that was more than 100 feet long from the house to My father loved music and one of his early purthe barn. chases was an Edison phonograph. About once a month he would bring home a new record. Many of these were brass band music because he loved the stirring marches. He purchased darice music and taught HELEN and BOB to dance. Their friends came to our house on Sunday afternoons and danced in our parlor where the Edison and the piano were located. My father was a better dancer than my mother. He was very light much arid graceful on his feet.

About 1922 my father purchased his first car. a one Model T coupe with about three pedals to operate the seat gear shift. He could not use it in the winter so he would jack it up and place it on blocks to take the weight off the tires. It was under a very fancy dust cover. We made one long trip in it when I was about five years old. His brot-DONALD. had been badly wounded and gassed with both her, mustard gas in World War I. DONALD was in a chlorine and Alto in Franklin County recuperating. Sanatarium at Mt. MV father had not seen him since 1917 and decided to visit. We drove over the mountains on either the Lincoln Highway or Pike. The motor boiled and my father had the National te crawl down the side of a gully to get water. On the steeper hills he had to back up because the Model T had more power reverse than in low gear. After an all day drive in we arrived near Mt. Alto. We were all amazed the next morning when we drove to the Sanatarium to find that we were driving above the low clouds. Uncle DON was able to get a pass and take us through the Battle Field at Gettysburg. He was a guide and I remember to this day the Pennsylvania pood Monument and the rocks of the Devil's Den. Usually we used the car only on drives on Sunday afternoon or a monthly visit to the home of my Zeitler grandparents. The visit to Punxsutawney was an all day affair. We left before eight am and started home before 6 pm. In those days my father worked nine hours per day six days per week. These late night drives home from Punxy did not leave much time for his rest but he was never one to complain and was a very nice person to be with.

My father sold his little Model T about 1924 for about \$350. He had served as an expert witness on a court trial in Pittsburgh and had an opportunity to look at new cars. One Sunday two men brought a Jewett from Pittsburgh to demonstrate it to my parents. On our first drive I was placed in the back seat and one of the demonstrators slammed the door on my thumb and smashed it flat. That got the demonstration off to a good start. My parents purchased the car and the first thing my father had to do was enlarge the barn because the little Model T had just filled the space and the Jewett was a much larger car.

With the larger car we made longer trips but with my father's working hours, Sunday was the only time the car was used. We walked to the Koontz Meat Market and Grocery Store in the five hundred block of Philadelphia Street. My mother walked to her parents home. People walked and did not need to ride every place. One of our favorite trips was an annual Sunday drive to Greensburg to visit the family of my mother's uncle HARRY McFEATERS. One long trip was made to Niagara Falls and the Thousand Islands in the St. Lawrence River. We visited Toronto and Ottawa. We did not really what the Canadians ment when they mentioned the understand Upper Parliment and the Lower Parliment. On the way home we stopped in Phillipsburg to visit my uncle WILLIS ZEITLER and his wife MATTIE. On this visit in my desire to hang around my father I stood on the rockers of his rocking chair and broke one of them. I never did find out how my father fixed his brother's chair.

In 1929 we moved to 700 Wayne Avenue. That summer my father had some kind of a health problem and worked around the house putting in brass water pipe, remodeling the bath room and installing a powder room on the first floor. He had carpenters remove the back stairs and make a new set of stairs to the cellar. He convinced the Water Department that they should connect a dead-end water main on Washington Street with the main line on Wayne Avenue so that the guality of the water in the Washington Street line would be improved and be free of sediment. Then he installed a new waterline to service our house from the Washington Street water main. All of this work was necessary because the water system in the house had been installed in 1904 and was almost closed off with calcium carbonate deposits. It was at this time he had the house rewired and my parents purchased our first electric refrigerator, a KO brand from Kaufman's Department Store in Pittsburgh.

My parents did their shopping for major appliances and clothing in Pittsburgh. I can remember going on the train from Indiana to Torrance and changing to the train on the mainline for Pittsburgh. We stayed overnight in a Hotel. We shopped Kaufman's, Gimble's and Horne's. One trip was made so that we could see the movie "The Big Parade." This was before "talkies" and the sound effects were enhanced with enormous drums back of the screen to simulate the sound of explosives. The organist accompanied the film on an enormous organ. We usually returned by train late Sunday night. Later with improved roads we drove to Pittsburgh and parked in the Fifth Avenue Garage within walking distance of Kaufman's.

One of the first things my father did on Wayne Avenue was to build a garage for our car on the back of the lot but first he had the property surveyed so that we would not encroach on my Aunt CORA. She had been given a double house on the back portion of my grandfather's lot. Jealosy had reared its ugly head and my aunt and her daughter had taken a violent dislike for my parents but especially my father. He certainly did not deserve it because he had tried to help raise her children but good deeds of the past are often It all started when my grandfather broke up. forgotten. housekeeping and divided his goods among his two daughters and the niece. The garage cost \$1000. and was a beauty. Our car had been stored in a neighbors barn and the ammornia fumes from the previous tenants, horses, had ruined the paint on our faithful Jewett. In 1930 my father purchased third car, a four door Dodge sedan with four speed his forward gear shift.

My father seldom punished me. He left that chore to my mother who was not afraid to use the peach switch across the backs of my bare legs. I remember one time when he came for me with a hickory stick, a hickory bow that he had made for me several years before. He called me out of the Moorhead home about a half-block from our house and he laid on with that stick all the way home. It seems I had failed to come at the right time for supper and my mother who was going through menopause had bedevilled him into going after me.

When I was a freshman in high school I went out for spring training for football. My mother really exploded and made life miserable for me but especially for my father. She cast up things to him that were apparently carry-overs from their years in Reynoldsville. She litterly cowed him and he finally came to me after I was in bed that night and asked me to not go out for football. I promised him that I would stop and not try to play ball. I really felt sorry for him. He never raised his voice to her. She relented the next day and I tried to play football but was never very good and finally broke a collarbone in my senior year and that ended that endeavor.

Finally when I was about seventeen my father decided it was time to teach me to drive. I was not a very apt pupil and he was disgusted with my lack of skill and coordination. He could really make me cringe with his criticism because I really wanted to shine for him. After failing the first attempt at the driver's test he took me out and really worked me every weekend until the next time I could try. I passed the second time. Although I always asked him for permission to use the car I sometimes ask my mother first. He usually was generous and permitted it but I am certain he checked with her first before granting my request. that when I went to the Junior-Senior Prom in May 1934 However, he drove me and my date to the high school and came to pick us after the dance. We delivered the young lady, MARTHA PAULSON, to her home. I found out later that another bov picked her up and they went to a roadhouse and danced the night away after I left with my father. I know that later at insistance of my mother he drove to a local roadhouse the looking for me and my date. My mother was convinced that I was there. We were not and never had been but I am certain that it was not his idea.

In the summer of 1933 my father got me about one weeks work digging ditch through a rock pile with a skilled ditch digger. It was not work and I was not that strong that I could hold out for a nine hour day. This money was my spending money when we went to the World's Fair in Chicago later that summer. The next summer he got me a job digging ditch again for a couple of weeks under an old house on Eleventh Street. The ditch was for a sewer and should have not been more than eight feet deep. However, my father was very knowledgeable about the utility lines in the city and realized that although the maps showed a depth of eight feet that eight feet of fill dirt had gone into this area and the ditch would end up about sixteen feet deep so he provided a skilled ditch digger to do the deep work. I did not realize at the time but we should have shored the walls. He it realized this was to big a job for me so I got the work but protected me with the other man doing the deep digging. he The summers of 1935-1938 saw me getting work with A. Τ. Taylor & Son because of my father. I worked as a plumber or steamfitter helper cutting and threading pipe and helping to carry the heavy objects for remodeled homes or businesses.

My father always walked up town Saturday evening. He would stop in at one or two businesses to talk to his friends. He usually purchased a few cigars and a little bag of candy. He always dressed in a suit and wore a hat, either a straw hat in summer or a felt hat in the other seasons. He always wore his gold case watch whenever he was dressed up. That is one of my prized posessions. ERIC has repaired it and I keep it in a glass bell-jar. One of his favorite stopping places was the Leydic Flower Shop on Philadelphia Street. Although my father walked to carry out his duties for A. T. Taylor & Son he never seemed to tire of walking and looked forward to these excursions on Saturday night.

We attended the First Methodist Church. I enjoyed going to sunday school with my father to the Men's Bible Class rather than go to the class with my peers. This started when I was in the fourth grade and did not like the elderly lady who was trying to teach boys and she knew nothing about boys. From then on I always tried to go with him rather than to my assigned class.

My father had his teeth removed in one full swoop and came back looking older than his father. Of course he had to have his food ground for him. Later he had health problems including what apparently was an ulcer for which he took kind of medication like aluminum hydroxide. This is some what eventually killed him. I was in California in the spring of 1947 and called home to talk to my parents. MV Mother answered the phone and told me that my father was in the hospital in desperate shape and the Red Cross had been trying to find me for several days. I was able to arrange a leave of absence because my former CD was now Chief of Staff for the West Coast Wing of the Air Transport Command. He ran into me as I left the phone booth with a shocked expression on my face. His kindness helped me get air transportation to Washington, DC and from there I took commercial airlines to Pittsburgh where Ted Dickey picked me up and drove me to Indiana. My father had suffered an obstruction of the intestines whick was malignant and left with a colostomy. He was blood type AB and no mention was made of his RH factor. That primative hospital did not even use A, B, O or AB blood types but had their own system. Apparently one of my father's problems was due to a transfusion that nearly killed him because of a mismatch in RH factor. I was able to stav with him for a whole week and had the pleasure of doing for him even if it was only to shave him. I returned to the Pacific to my wife and little son happy in the knowledge that I had spent this much time with him.

When we finally returned for discharge in May of 1947 I was shocked to learn that he was in the hospital and Red Cross had been trying to locate me for two days. He had been recovering from his operation of January and had even done some work measuring plans for A. T. Taylor & Son when he suffered a ruptured peptic ulcer. When we walked into his hospital room that day of our return from service 12 May 1947 it was to see him breathe his last.

We buried him in Oakland Cemetery and as luck would have it some of my relatives took this opportunity to get huffy about inadvertantly being left out of the family room in the family home during the funeral services. Here again I blew it and had the funeral director who had handled my grandfather and grandmother's funerals when I should have had my father's friend Mr. Leydic handle the funeral. It was in his flower shop where my father liked to visit on his Saturday evening trips to town.

One thing my father always enjoyed was playing cards. I remember that he and my mother and their friends played five

hundred for years. Then in later life he enjoyed playing pinochle with my mother's cousin, DORA STEPHENS RHINE and her husband FRANK. Sometimes this included the Streams family and they would have a steak fry before the battle of the cards. My father was very gregarious and had an excellent sense of humor. Some of his sayings were extremely funny and nearly always original. He was an excellent story teller. Sometimes his stories were a little earthy but they were funny and not really in bad taste.

LYDIA BEOLIA MCFEATERS, my mother, was the sixth and last child of WILLIAM CAMPBELL McFEATERS and LEAH ANN MOOR-HEAD. She was born 14 September 1887 on the family farm near Greenville now known as Penn Run, PA. At birth she was named ADONIA HAHN McFEATERS but this was changed early to LYDIA for her grandmother, LYDIA HAHN MOORHEAD, the wife of DAVID MOORHEAD. She was eight years younger than her sister, CORA, and seventeen years younger than her oldest brother, VERNON AMBROSE McFEATERS.

She evidently was left to her own devices for playmates and being so much younger was probably spoiled by her family. She frequently mentioned that she had only cats and sheep for playmates most of the time. Pictures of her early life bear this out.

BEOLIA or BLIE as she preferred to be called graduated from Indian High School 10 May 1905. AS OLIE McFEATERS she received the Pennsylvania Common School Diploma 16 April 1903 which indicated that she had completed the course of study in the various branches prescribed to be taught in the Public Schools of Indiana County in Orthography, Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, English, Grammar, Geography, Physiolo-United State History, Civil Government and Civics. My 9Y. mother was excellent in Mathematics and evidently in high school had done well in several areas. I know that in my freshman year in high school I was sick most of the first six weeks of school but she tutored me in algebra and latin so that when I returned to school I was able to keep up with the class. She often told me of how her older brother, LOWRY, had drilled her in arithmetic when she was a small girl and how good her father was in "mental arithmetic." Throughout my grade school days she tutored me in spelling and several other areas because her little boy was frequently absent from school but he never fell behind because of her firm discipline and tutoring skills.

BEOLIA took special music lessons at the Indiana Normal School after graduation from high school and her father purchased a piano for her use. This piano was in our home until she sold out to move to Texas. It did not make the move to Reynoldsville but it definitely was in our home at 451 Philadelphia Street, and it was on this piano that I took lessons from THELMA MODRHEAD, my mother's cousin.

BEOLIA being the last chick in the nest was a constant companion of her mother. Many of the beautiful and fine china pieces in her collection were purchased on shopping trips with her mother. Her mother frequently came to our house to visit. She was my companion during those early years when I was frequently sick and had to stay in bed for long stretches at a time. This permitted my mother to take care of business and do the shopping.

My father always came home for lunch and BEOLIA always cooked his breakfast, lunch and supper. She was an excellent cook and had a good knowledge of nutrition. She alternated our diet and we usually had fish once or twice a month even if it were only salmon croquettes. The same way with fruit, during the winter we frequently had peaches and pears that she had canned. She usually canned fruits and vegatables during the summer and saw that we had green vegatables frequently during the winter. Grapes were made into grape juice and jelly. Peaches and pears were canned or made into preserves. Cucumbers produced pickles in her kitchen. She made succotash from lima beans and corn. Also, piccalili was a favorite. Tomatoes were canned or the yellow tomatoes were made into preserves with a thin slice of lemon with the rind in every jar. These canned foods were stored in our cellar Philadelphia Street and after our move to Wayne Avenue on she still canned but to a lesser extent.

I remember that she always made apple butter after we were located on Wayne Avenue because we had two large apple trees. One tree was always loaded with yellow delicious apples. The other tree had many grafts and produced a wide variety of apples. My grandfather liked to experiment and these grafts were made under his direction. We used an apple pealer to prepare the apples and then they were cored prior to the cook-down. My mother always used a cherry pitter to prepare the red sour cherries for canning. From these she prepared wonderful cherry pies. My father was never fat and his strenuous work resulted in large meals and frequent desserts since he never had to worry about gaining weight. Pies, cakes, cobblers, and dumplings were frequently on the menu.

I remember My mother making her own bread during those early years on Philadelphia Street. That crust from the fresh loaf was always the best part and it was difficult to wait for the loaf to cool. One evening when I was about five years old I waited until my mother had gone to visit Miss Gable and I tried to slice the loaf to get the crust while she was away. I got the crust but it nearly cut my left index finger off between the first two joints and that was a very bloody crust. I don't remember but I probably got what I deserved with the peach switch.

Each winter the buckwheat crock was in operation. We frequently had pancakes and buckwheat cakes in our diet. These were either topped with maple syrup or with honey. My uncle WILLIS always shipped honey to my father by Railway Express each winter to sell for him. There was usually orie case for us. The combs may not have been perfect but the honey was delicious and came in two flavors: clover arid The latter was the really dark honey and buckwheat. the clover was very light in color with a different flavor and odor. My parents acted as agents for My uncle and sold the other cases at four pounds for a dollar.

My parents both seemed to enjoy raising flowers. It was my job to weed the flower beds. Also, twice a year I edged those beds along with mowing the grass from the time I wasbig enough to push the reel mower. Shoveling snow fell to my after I got big enough to shovel the walks. lot The same thing with the ashes from the furnace. My father wet them down to reduce the dust when him lifted them from the ash pit. Once a week the buckets were carried to the back of our lot where the pile accumulated until time to make the spring garden and then the trashman was hired to remove the pile. My father and mother did most of the firing of the furnace. Since my mother was home alone during the day she probably fired the furnace more than my father and I combined. When the song, "Sixteen Tons" was popular she often stated that she had shoveled more than sixteen tons each winter for years.

My mother never learned to drive the car and never showed any desire to learn. After my father died she sold their car, a '38 Plymouth, to me. There were many times during the years when I was living in Cleveland or commuting three days a week to Cleveland that she could have used a car to get from her house to our house on Washington Street. In those years THELMA was frequently struck with a migrain type of head ache and she would call my mother and ask her to come and feed our little boys. When this happened my mother had to hire a taxi to make the trip.

In 1958 my mother sold at auction her furniture, dishes, antiques and her house. She came to Texas and flew from Pittsburgh to Houston's Hobby Airport. We met her plane and brought her to Lake Jackson to live in the mother-in-law apartment which we had built on the rear of our home. She paid the cost of building the apartment. She had her OWY entrance but could enter our house with ease any time she desired. Since she had her own kitchen she prepared her own meals except when we had family dinners. However, after her first broken hip we built an addition which connected the two houses at one level. Prior to this it was necessary to

step down from her house and walk across a breezeway then step up into our house. When the family room addition was completed it was possible for her with a walker and later with a wheel chair to move easily into our home and we ate all meals as a family.

Our arrival home with her first grandchild just as her husband died gave her an object to love and our first child, ARTHUR, held a special place in her heart. This appeared to be the case with the last two children, which came eight and thirteen years after the first two. Possibly because she was our official baby-sitter for KURT and KARLENE was the reason for her deep affection for them.

We made two family trips with mother after she came to Texas and before her first broken hip. The first trip was to Brownsville and then up the valley to Laredo. We went on to San Antonic to visit the Missions and the Alamo before returning home. This was made between Christmas and New Years about 1959. The other trip was an attempt to visit New Braunfels and it was a flop because the living quarters that we could afford were inadequate. Our trip to avoid Carla in 1961 was the last long trip she made with us. Shortly after her recovery from the first broken hip she broke the second hip and after that she was confined to a wheel chair until her final illness when she was bed ridden in the hospital in 1965. During these three years we made several long family trips but twice they were made while she was confined in the hospital and our vacations had been scheduled well in advance. During one of those trips HELEN and ED WRIGHT frequently visited her in the hospital.


The mastectomy in the early sixties had not halted the spread of cancer and her final illness was due to the spread of this disease. She died 16 March 1965 in the Brazosport Memorial Hospital. We carried her ashes to Indiana that summer and buried them in Oakland Cemetery beside her husband, HARRY.

LYDIA BEOLIA MEFEATERS HARRY ARTHUR ZEITLER

JOHN BEYER ZEITLER AND MARY LAURA LINCOLN HICKOX

JOHN BEYER ZEITLER was born 14 April 1843 in Pross, Bavaria, the oldest son of WILHELM ZEITLER, shoemaker, and ANNA BARBARA KNAUER. He immigrated with his parents and arrived in the Port of Baltimore, MD 17 Jun 1846. The family purchased land and settled in McCalmont Township, Jefferson County, PA.

JDHN ZEITLER was drafted during the Civil War but never served. He worked as a woodsman and as a mill hand at the O'Donnel Mills in Winslow Township, Jefferson County, PA at the time me married MARY LAURA LINCOLN HICKOX, 24 May 1877. They were married in Oliveburg, PA in a double wedding where the other bride was LAURA's older sister CLARA CLARIS-SA HICKOX and the groom, JAMES HENRY. The witnesses were THOMAS HICKOX, brother of the brides, and Miss MARIA ZEIT-LER. MARIA is probably the half-sister of JOHN and in the 1880 census is listed as a servant in the O'Donnel family. Although she is listed in the 1870 census as MARIAH and in the 1880 she is also listed as MARAH and living with her parents.

The JOHN B. ZEITLER family eventually moved to Punxsutawney, PA where JOHN worked as a laborer in the glass works and at a planing mill as a carpenter. He built the family home at 108 Zeitler Avenue which was at the edge of town. Here on two adjoining lots JOHN and LAURA raised their family of three boys and four girls. JOHN always had a large garden, a cow and a pig or two. My father always remarked about the good sausage his father made when they butchered. JOHN was a good carpenter. The house was well built. I remember the seat of the privy was extremely smooth, the result of JOHN ZEITLER's handiwork. An excellent spring in the middle of the lower lot supplied the drinking water.

I can only remember one visit that JOHN ZEITLER made to our home on Philadelphia Street. He evidently had trouble cutting his meat so he took my mother's knives to the barn and sharpened them. She was very angry that he ground edges on her silver plated knives.

The thing I remember best about my grandfather was his enjoyment of reading. When we visited in his home, he frequently sat reading with his legs crossed and the free foot tapping the floor. He was in his seventies and used a magnifying glass in addition to his glasses. There he would sit moving slowly across the page and his foot tapping. The chatter of several women and grandchildren running around his feet never seemed to bother him.

My father received the muzzel-loading percussion cap rifle with the powder horn made from the horn of their old cow, the bullet mold and pocket pouch for shot, wads, powder and caps. My grandfather gave me his cane. He told my father that it had always been handed down in the ZEITLER family to Since I was the only granthe son or grandson named JOHN. dson named ZEITLER I received the cane. It was too long for I my grandfather so the six-inch iron tip had been removed. have since replaced the original iron tip on the cane. The small tip of the handle was broken off years ago and is in my jewel case. It will be replaced some day. The cane was made from a cherry sapling and had been in the family for "A generations in Germany. My grandfather's favorite book, History of the Civil War," by Benson J. Lossing and illustrated with pictures taken by Mathew Brady, was given to me by my grandmother in 1932. JOHN B. ZEITLER received it in 1915 but never tired of reading in it.

JOHN BEYER ZEITLER died 19 July 1925 of kidney failure a short illness. My father went home to help during after that illness. He supplied the information for the death thought his grandmother's maiden name certificate. He was BARBARA was the daughter of JOHANN KNAUER BEYER. ANNA and MARGARETHE ANNA BARBARA BEYER. ANNA BARBARA made her home her son, JOHN, after the death of her husband. MV with said that John and his mother conversed in German. father tried to teach my father German but according to ANNA She was too stuborn and devilish to learn. Since BARBARA he never adopted JOHN BEYER ZEITLER he did WILHELM had not share in his father's land holdings and the estate.

WILLIS ZEITLER following his marriage to MARTHA WATSON settled in Phillipsburg, PA. He was the manager of a laundry and very active in the Volunteer Fire Department. I carı remember seeing him as Fire Chief lead his company ír, a parade. He had many hives of bees scattered throughout the mountains and carried on an extensive apiary business for many years. The laundry failed during World War II and he returned to the parental home following surgery for the removal of a kidney. Their daughter PHYLLIS graduated as a nurse in Philadelphia. She entered the Army Nurses Corps during World War II and served until her retirement as a Major. Their daughter THELMA married JACK FULTON who was with the Paul Whiteman Band for several years. JACK was a very successful singer on radio in the Chicago area for Many years and a composer of note.

DAISY CLARISSA ZEITLER married JACK TEATS. They had three daughters: GERALDINE, DOROTHY and HELEN LOUISE. GERALDINE and DOROTHY graduated from the Indiana Normal School and taught school. HELEN LOUISE took her nurses training in Johnstown, PA. DAISY was killed in a tragic auto accident in 1968. MARY LARUE ZEITLER married HARRY J. KENNARD and lived in Plumbville, PA for several years while he was connected with the coal mines. They later operated a beauty shop in Punxsutawney, PA.

GLADYS IRENE ZEITLER married SAMUEL ALLISON and lived in Punxsutawney. Uncle Sam was accidently electrocuted by a faulty extension cord while recovering a tool lost in a boiler. Aunt GLADYS for many years made her living by baking very lovely and popular cakes for weddings and special occasions. Their only child, JOHN ALLISON, was for many years connected with Swift & Co. in Punxsutawney. We visited Aunt GLADYS in 1983 and 1984 in the Jefferson Manor Rest Home in Brookville, PA where she died just before her 96th birthday.

DONALD EUGENE ZEITLER was severely wounded and gassed in World War I. After his discharge from the Veterans Sanitarium at Mt. Alto, PA he returned to the parental home. He tried to operate a photographic studio and later served as a fish warden for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. In his later life he was a security guard in one of the governmental office buildings in Washington, DC. He is buried in Arlington Cemetery. His only son, ROBERT, and I were stationed just a few miles apart on Dahu in 1945 and 1946. On several occasions we were able to get together for shore leave.

FRANCES ISABELLA ZEITLER worked in Philadelphia for several years and returned to the parental home. She worked for many years in the Kennard Beauty Shop. Later she worked as a supervisor in a local clothing manufacturing plant.

GLADYS, LARUE and FRANCES took care of their mother in her last years when LAURA was bed ridden with a broken hip. Our son ARTHUR remembers visitng although he was only three years old and hearing his great-grandmother and her daughters harmonizing on old hymns.

WILLIAM CAMPBELL MCFEATERS AND LEAH ANN MOORHEAD

WILLIAM CAMPBELL McFEATERS, the second son of MARK McFEATERS and REBECCA GRAHAM, was born 15 August 1848 in Indiana County, PA. He married LEAH ANN MOORHEAD, the daughter of DAVID MOORHEAD and LYDIA HAHN, 14 February 1870. LEAH ANN was born four days earlier, 11 August 1848 in Indiana County, PA. At their Golden Anniversary in their home on Wayne Avenue, Indiana, PA, LORETTA MOORHEAD ALLISON remarked that she was the only person in the room other than the bride and groom who had been present at the wedding.

The family resided in Cherry Hill Township and attended church in Greenville, now called Penn Run, and were affluent because my mother said that one team of grays was only used to pull the carriage on Sunday to church. WILLIAM was on the road most of the week with his business which consisted of several days collecting produce such as butter and eggs for his twice weekly trip to Johnstown, PA to supply the stores. This was called "huckstering" in those days. Hence the farm work was handled by hired hands with assistance from his older sons under the direction of their mother, LEAH ANN. one of his side lines was fattening long-horn steers from Texas. WILLIAM would purchase them, about fifty at a time, and drive them from the yards in Pittsburgh to his farms in Indiana County. There they were dehorned. My mother often told of the mess when the dehorning was going on.

The parents made a trip to Europe about 1900 and the World's Fair Exposition in Paris so impressed them that they then made extended trips to similar Expositions on the West Coast and to Saint Louis. Thus LYDIA BEOLIA was left at home in the care of her older brother and sister. By this time CARRIE and VERNON were married and in their own homes. THOMAS or TOM was probably living in Tyrone, PA, married and running a jewelry store, LOWRY and CORA were the only children left at home.

About 1903 WILLIAM retired and moved to Indiana, PA. The family now consisted of only one daughter at home. They lived in rented rooms next door while their home at 700 Wayne Avenue was being constructed.

WILLIAM became bored with retirement and took odd jobs to fill out his time. He tried owning a car but since it would not respond to gee or haw or whoa it was sold after he had a wreck in which a young boy was run over and killed.

LEAH ANN was a tiny gentle woman who was active in her church and in the W.C.T.U. She loved flowers and had various flower beds which she worked alone. WILLIAM did not appreciate them until after her death. For many years he would gather a handful of any flowers in the yard and walk to the cemetery to put them on her grave. It was about a four mile round trip, a long walk for a man in his eighties.

My grandmother often visited me when I was sick in bed. She walked the mile or more each time to visit me. She taught me to embroider. I made most of the patches in the animal quilt that was used on my bed for many years.

LEAH ANN had a heart condition which finally caused her death. CORA and my mother, BEOLIA, took care of her during her final illness. WILLIAM became senile in the Depression after losing most of his assets due to the failure of the First National Bank of Indiana and the Cambria County Street Railway Company. His four-hundred-fifty shares of Pennsylvania Railroad stock decreased enormously in value and paid very poor dividends. The tenants in his eight rent houses had difficulty in paying their rent. This was a little too much for him. His incessant prowling at night prevented my parents from getting their rest. Other forms of senility caused my mother to have Judge Langham commit him to the State Hospital at Torrance where he died of erysipelas contracted in the hospital barber shop. Both he and LEAH ANN are buried beside their sons, THOMAS and VERNON, in Greenwood Cemetery, Indiana, PA.

My grandfather was generous in his distribution of his estate. His will gave one hundred shares of Pennsylvania Railroad stock to each of his four grandchildren. I used mine to finance the year's leave of absence without pay to earn my degree at Western Reserve University.

WILHELM ZEITLER AND ANNA BARBARA KNAUER

WILHELM was born 4 Oct 1820 in Grafengehaig, Frankenwald, Bavaria, the son of JOHANN CONRAD ZEITLER and MARGARE-THE WEISS. ANNA BARBARA KNAUER was born 7 Mar 1820 in Thernau the daughter of JOHANN KNAUER and MARGARETHE ANNA BARBA-RA BEYER.

WILHELM made his initial application for citizenship in the Courts of Allegheny County, PA 6 Oct 1846. His citizen-ship was granted 15 Sep 1851 by the Courts of Armstrong County, PA. In the final application WILHELM stated that he had arrived at the Port of Baltimore, MD 17 Jun 1846. The name of the ship has not been found. JOHN BEYER ZEITLER and a second son, JOHN GEORGE ZEITLER, born in 1845 accompanied parents. GEORGE is listed as a harness maker living at the home of his parents in the 1880 census but no later the references have been found. The 1880 census shows a son, WILLIAM, age nine born in Dhio. It is possible that he is a grandson of WILHELM and a son of GEORGE. Nothing more is known of either person. Apparently six daughters were born to this couple according to the 1850-1880 census schedules. However, only five are listed in the final distribution of WILHELM's estate.

WILHELM ZEITLER died in McCalmont Township, Jefferson County, PA 13 Aug 1883 intestate. The Orphans Court, Petition Docket Volume 1, page 280 stated that his estate would be divided, one-third to the widow, BARBARA ZEITLER, and the remaining two-thirds would be equally divided among the five daughters. The daughters in order of birth were: CASSIE m. WINGERT of Jefferson County, PA; ELIZABETH mar-WILLIAM F. ried BERNARD KEIGEN, Jefferson County; MAGGIE C. married to J. S. MODDY of Bradford, McKean County, PA; MARIAH A. married to FRANK A. BOYER of Bolivar, Allegany County, NY; and ANNIE married to W. H. THOMAS of Jefferson, County, PA. Since the estate consisted of one hundred-sixty acres and could not be divided it was placed for sale at an estimated value of five-thousand-seven-hundred-sixty dollars. JOHN, GEORGE, WILLIAM and a daughter BARBARA were not listed in the distribution. BARBARA was listed as nineteen years old in the 1880 census but not in the 1870 census. The widow did not choose to serve as executor of the estate when letters of administration were issued. In the distribution BARBARA took a piece of property, probably her little house in Elk Run, PA as her share of the estate. The estate was relatively small, less than \$1100. In the 1900 census ANNA BARBARA was enumerated as living with her sister-in-law, ANNA K. WEISS, on Church Street, Punxsutawney, PA. She is buried in Circle Hill Cemetery, Punxsutawney, PA following her death 19 January 1910.

THOMAS WILLIAMS HICKOX AND MARY ELIZABETH HECKENDORN

THOMAS WILLIAMS HICKOX, the son of REUBEN HICKOX II and CATHERINE WILLIAMS, was born in Jefferson County, PA, 5 Aug 1825 and named for his maternal grandfather. He married MARY ELIZABETH HECKENDORN 27 Dec 1847 in Coolspring, PA. She was the daughter of HENRY HECKENDORN and HARRIET CHANDLER born 10 Jul 1833 near Brookville, PA. She was only 14 years old when they married and of her fifteen children the first four died young.

THOMAS was a carpenter and built their little house near Oliveburg on an acre of ground which he purchased from his parents. My father took me to see the house and his grave when I was about fourteen years old. It was hard to imagine a family of thirteen people living in such a small house. THOMAS branched out into contracting. A grand-daug-GLADYS ZEITLER ALLISON. remembered that her hter, mother said he always wore a white shirt. His executors' account indicated that THOMAS had a contract with the Post Office Department to carry the mail and the estate received payments for at least two years after his death.

THOMAS HICKOX wrote his will 31 Aug 1877 and died 26 Sep 1877. He bequeathed all real and personal property to his wife so long as she remained his widow. If she remarried the property was to be sold and the proceeds equally divided between his wife and their eleven children whom he named, "Except my son, JOSEPH D. HICKOX, who is to have twenty-five dollars more than the other heirs provided he remain a good, obedient and industrious boy and help his mother to provide for and assist her in the support and maintenance of the family."

When EMANUEL ALLISON HICKOX enlisted in the army he stated that his father died of a gun-shot wound. THOMAS died of a gun-shot wound inflicted by a disgruntled employee, THOMAS BRENNAN. BRENNAN and his wife fled and eluded the Sheriff. THOMAS is buried in the Hopewell Methodist Church Cemetery at Frostburg, Jefferson County, PA.

The families of REUBEN RESSER HICKOX, JAMES and CLARA HICKOX HENRY, JOSEPH OSCAR HICKOX and their mother, MARY ELIZABETH HICKOX, moved to Oklahoma Territory in the 1880's. REUBEN served as a farmer to instruct the Indians. JOSEPH was a licensed Indian Trader. Both men made the run with the other "Boomers" but their Indian friends had horses staked out for them and they claimed homesteads in the center of El Reno, OK. STACY WILLIAMS HICKOX and his family are enumerated in Caddo County, OK in the 1910 census. He had previously lived in Nebraska and Iowa.

The obituary of MARY ELIZABETH HICKOX appeared in the El Reno newspaper as follows. "Mary E. Hickox, widow of the late Thomas Hickox was born in Jefferson County, PA, in 1833. She was a daughter of Harry A. Heckendorn, deceased, of Brookville. Her husband died at the old homestead, at Oliveburg, in 1877. Mrs. Hickox went west in 1894. She had good health until the death of her son, Joe, who died Feb. 1901; from that time she failed in health rapidly. She was a member of the M. E. Church for fifty years, in which she served as an earnest Christian." She is buried in the City Cemetery, El Reno, OK on the same plot as REUBEN R. HICKOX and his wife, MARY CATHERINE, and near the grave of JOSEPH D. HICKOX.

In August 1962 VERNON ZEITLER, THELMA and their four children visited Aunt CLARA HICKOX HENRY in her home in Burbank, CA. She was a tiny woman who spoke in a calm, quiet manner and was completely blind. She felt the faces of each member of our family as they were introduced. Her daughter MABEL CLOW, and one son were living with her. She was 103 years old at that time but died the next year after her 104th birthday.

MARK MCFEATERS AND REBECCA GRAHAM

MARK McFEATERS, the son of JOHN McFEATERS and HANNAH was born 4 Dec 1822 in Wheatfield Township, Indiana County, PA. He married REBECCA GRAHAM, the daughter of JOHN GRAHAM, JR. and REBECCA STEPHENS, born 16 Dec 1825 in Wheatfield, Township.

Some of MARK's children have middle names which honor the ancestors of REBECCA, i.e., JOHN GRAHAM McFEATERS and THOMAS STEPHENS McFEATERS. My grandfather, WILLIAM CAMPBELL McFEATERS is an enigma. My mother indicated that he was named for the maiden name of a grandmother. Thus by elimination the wife of JOHN McFEATERS may have been HANNAH CAM-PBELL.

MARK in his will of 22 Aug 1887 made a distribution as follows: "First to my daughter, SARAH E. SCHRECKENGHOST, one horse, one cow, six sheep, and one hog. All my carpet and kitchen furniture. Two beds and bedding. One of which beds shall be of feathers. The sewing machine, the chest and contents and such other articles in my house as she may claim to be her own. Second, I give and bequeath to my said daughter SARAH E. the sum of five hundred dollars to compensate her for services rendered me in my life time. Third, I give and begueath the following legacies to the persons hereafter named: To my son JOHN G. McFEATERS the sum of eight hundred dollars. To my son WILLIAM C. McFEATERS the sum of eight hundred dollars. To my son ROBERT McFEATERS the sum of eight hundred dollars. To my son THOMAS S. McFEATERS the sum of eight hundred dollars. To my son MATTHEW A. McFEATERS the sum of eight hundred dollars. To my son ANDREW McFEATERS the sum of eight hundred dollars, and to my A. daughter SARAH E. SCHRECKENGHOST the sum of eight hundred dollars.".... "Sixth, all the rest and residue of my estate remaining after the payment heretofore directed have been made I give and bequeath to my children: JDHN G., WILLIAM ROBERT N., THOMAS S., MATTHEW A., SARAH E., ANDREW A., C., and HARRY M. share and share alike." This was the only time the youngest child, HARRY M., was mentioned. JOHN G. and ROBERT N. were the executors.

MARK died 23 Dec 1889 almost six years after REBECCA, 18 Dec 1883. Since they were living in Cherry Hill Township they were buried in Harmony Cemetery about one mile east of Penn Run, Indiana County, PA. MARK served as administrator in the distribution of his bachelor brother, ROBERT's estate. ROBERT lived with MARK's family most of his life although he had extensive farms of his own.

Most of MARK's sons gravitated to the large cities and

industries. Only WILLIAM continued as a farmer. Three sons moved to the Johnstown, PA area, viz, JOHN in Morrelville; ANDREW and THOMAS to Conemaugh. MATTHEW moved to Homewood in the Pittsburgh area. HARRY an engineer for the Pennsylvania Railroad settled in Westmoreland County. We frequently visited my mother's uncles, especially HARRY McFEATERS in Greensburg, PA. They in turn visited us in addition to attending the annual McFEATERS-ALTIMUS-CRESSWELL reunion.



CHAPTER B

DAVID MOORHEAD AND LYDIA HAHN

DAVID MOORHEAD was born 17 Nov 1816 in Washington Township, Franklin County, PA. He married LYDIA HAHN, born 14 Nov 1818 in "The Cove," Washington County, Maryland. The marriage ceremony was performed by the Reverend Dr. GEORGE WASHINGTON GLESSNER in the German Reformed Church in Waynesboro, Franklin County on 15 Aug 1839. This was a double wedding. LYDIA ANN MOORHEAD, DAVID's only sister, married LEWIS RHA (RHEA or RAY) at the same time.

In the 1840 census DAVID is the head of the household, his father having died prior to the wedding. His mother, BARBARA, is living with him and his wife, LYDIA, in Washington Township, Franklin County on the home plantation which he had inherited in his father's will.

In the 1850 to 1880 census schedules DAVID always stated that LYDIA and both of her parents were born in Maryland. Family tradition claimed that she was born in "The Cove." However, the "Big Cove" is in Fulton County, PA and directly south of it is the "Little Cove" which was transferred from Bedford County, PA to Montgomery Township, Franklin County, when Fulton County was formed. For a long time the location of the Maryland-Pennsylvania border was in doubt but the "Little Cove" does not extend into the present state of Maryland. In 1818 it was in Bedford County, PA. Hence the actual location of her birth is in doubt.

DAVID MODRHEAD and LYDIA HAHN sold the home plantation in Washington Township 14 April 1841. By his father's will DAVID's mother, BARBARA, retained her dower rights of onethird. DAVID and his sister, LYDIA, were to select three disinterested persons to appraise the property. DAVID was to received \$500. for services to his father and the residue was to be divided equally between DAVID and LYDIA, his sister. After BARBARA's death DAVID sold the plantation, only a little over 116 acres remained, to TOBIAS FUNK for \$5,500. DAVID and LYDIA moved to Brush Valley Township, Indiana County, PA where they and their children appear in the 1850-1880 census schedules. All of their children were born on the home farm in Brush Valley Township.

My parents frequently visited my mother's aunts such as MARY JANE PATTERSON of Freeport, PA and LORETTA ALLISON. I remember frequent visits with "Aunt Retta." She had been the midwife present when my mother was born. Many of my mother's cousins, grandchildren of DAVID and LYDIA, lived near Indiana, and were frequent visitors in our home or we in theirs. KATHRYN MODRHEAD and MARGARET, her adopted sister, lived on South Fifth Street in the SAMUEL NEWTON MODRHEAD home and were special friends of my mother. DORA (CAMERON) STEPHENS RHINE, a daughter of EMILY ELLEN MOORHEAD and LOWRY CAMERON was also a special friend. I worked for DORA each spring and helped with her spring house cleaning to earn spending money. In fact my piano teacher, THELMA MOORHEAD, was a grand-daughter of SAMUEL NEWTON MOORHEAD. WILLIAM WALKER MOORHEAD was the only uncle that I can remember. After he moved to Indiana, PA my mother would visit in his home.

JOHN CONRAD ZEITLER AND HIS ANCESTORS

JOHN CONRAD ZEITLER, shoemaker, and his wife, MARGARET-HE born WEISS arrived in Baltimore 8 Nov 1847 on the ship B. Bohlin accompanied by four children: JOHANN, age 16; KATHA-RINE (ANNA CATHERINE) age 20; JACOB, age 14; and JOHN GEOR-GE, age 11. His oldest son's family; WILHELM, ANNA BARBARA and their two sons, JOHN BEYER and JOHANN GEORGE had arrived in the Port of Baltimore, 17 Jun 1846. JOHN CONRAD and his family followed WILHELM to Jefferson County, PA and purchased several hundred acres of virgin land where Punxsutawney, PA now stands.

ANNA CATHERINE married GEORGE WEISS and they are buried in Circle Hill Cemetery, Punxsutawney, PA. ANNA BARBARA ZEITLER, widow of WILHELM, was enumerated with ANNA CATHE-RINE, sister-in-law, in the 1900 census. They were living on Church Street, Punxsutawney, PA.

In the 1870 census CATHERINE, daughter of WILHELM, was enumerated as living as housekeeper in the home of JOHN CONRAD, age 77, and MARGARETHE, age 76.

Research in Germany by KENT MUELLER (4.4.3.1) identified the parents of JOHN CONRAD ZEITLER as ANDREAS ZEITLER and MARGARETHE MESETH of Grafengehaig, Frankenwald, Bavaria. His grandparents were JOHANN ZEITLER and CATHARINA FRIEDRICH also of Grafengehaig, Frankenwald, Bavaria.

REUBEN HICKOX II AND CATHERINE WILLIAMS

REUBEN HICKOX II was born 11 Nov 1793 in New Haven County, CT and married CATHERINE WILLIAMS, born 15 Jul 1800 at Forestburgh, Ulster County (now Sullivan County) NY. She was the daughter of THOMAS WILLIAMS II and MARIA QUICK. They were married 2 May 1816 and lived in that county until they moved to Jefferson County, PA in 1823. REUBEN served as a Private in Captain Newhall Taintor's Company of Connecticut (sic) Drafted Militia 18 Aug 1814 to 27 Det 1814.

REUBEN was a farmer, hunter and trapper. Dr. McKnight wrote of him: "His hunting exploits alone would make a book. He, in three days, caught six bears, and in the early part of the season, in less than three months, secured over 50 of the 'bruin' family. He trapped and hunted principally for bears and wolves. Wild cats were numerous and often got into his traps, but he cared naught for them, as their fur was valueless, only bringing in the market 10 cents apiece. As for the deer, they formed a major portion of his bill of fare. Turkeys, wild ducks, etc. were numerous, and whenever he had a desire for fowl, his trusty rifle would soon secure an amount far in excess of the wants of his family."

REUBEN'S obituary mentions twelve children but only nine have been identified. Three may have died young for in the 1820 census there are two girls listed and we have identified only LYDIA. In the 1830 census there are two girls not identifiable by name. Also, in "Tombstone Hoppin'," Vol. 2, p. 292 we find a WILLIAM HICKOX buried in Jefferson County who died 16 Feb 1844 AE 229 8m 14d which calculates to a birth date of 2 Jun 1821 where we find a noticeable gap in the list of known children.

LYDIA HICKOX, the oldest child, was born at Forestburgh, Sullivan County, NY, 11 Aug 1819. She married WIL-LIAM McKINSTRY in Jefferson County 25 Feb 1841. They are reported to have had thirteen children but the names of seven appear in the census schedules from 1850 to 1870. WILLIAM born 9 Dec 1802 at Apollo, PA died at Coolspring, PA in 1880. LYDIA then married a Mr. Harel. She died at Coolspring 3 Jun 1887.

CHARLES WILLIAMS HICKDX was born in Forestburgh, NY, 19 Mar 1823. He married NANCY CATHERINE MCKEE 26 May 1846. six of their eight children married but MARGARET JANE and MARY CATHERINE died in infancy. NANCY died at Diveburg 25 Jul 1896 and CHARLES at Frostburg 29 Jun 1902.

THOMAS WILLIAMS HICKOX named for his maternal grandfather was the first child born after their move to Jefferson County, PA, 4 Aug 1825. He married MARY ELIZABETH HECKENDORN 27 Dec 1847. He died 26 Sep 1877. This family is covered in Chapter 6.

CAROLINE HICKOX was born near Oliveburg, PA about 1827. She married LEVI GEARHART, a farmer. She is reported to have died at age twenty leaving only one child. However, the family appears in the 1850 census in Beaver Township and in the 1870 census and 1880 census in Ringold Township. Either her death date is in error or LEVI married a second woman also named CAROLINE. The names of nine children appear in these census schedules.

JOHN HICKOX was born on the home farm near Oliveburg, PA 19 May 1828. He married MARTHA JANE BAIRD 3 May 1848. They had six children. JOHN enlisted as a private in Company C, 206th Regiment, PA Volunteer Infantry. MARTHA died in Shawnee County, KS 12 Apr 1891 and JOHN in Lecompton, KS 25 Jan 1909.

EVALINE ELMIRA HICKOX born near Oliveburg 18 Oct 1829. She married WILLIAM HENRY BIEGELSIN SPRANKLE. They had thirteen children but three: REUBEN, TECHUMSEH and ANNA died young. WILLIAM, a blacksmith, appears in the 1870 census in Trade City, Indiana County, North Mahoning Township with ten children at home.

JAMES HENRY HICKOX was born near Oliveburg 14 Feb 1832. He married SUSANNA TAYLOR SWEITZER who was born at Bellefont, PA 10 Jul 1830. She died 12 Sep 1866 and he died 30 Jan 1907

JOSEPH WILLIAMS HICKOX was born about 1838. He married SARAH ELDER born 7 Sep 1844 at Oliveburg, PA. Their son ISIAH L. HICKOX was born about 1859 in Perry Township, Jefferson County, PA. JOSEPH enlisted 23 Aug 1861 in Company A, 105th Regiment, PA Volunteer Infantry. He died 16 Nov 1862 in St. Aloysius Hospital, Washington DC and is buried in grave 5568 Soldiers Home National Cemetery. JAMES M. MORRIS, a neighbor and an uncle of JOSEPH was appointed guardian of ISIAH. ISIAH married a widow, ELIZABETH CHAPPEL, and they had a son, MADISON born 1879.

MARY JANE HICKOX was born near Oliveburg 23 May 1842 and married 11 Oct 1859 to OSCAR FITZALLEN WINSLOW. They had seven children, four appear in the 1880 census in Punxsutawney. OSCAR died 7 Jul 1894 but MARY JANE lived until 19 Mar 1931.

HENRY HECKENDORN AND HARRIET CHANDLER

HENRY was born about 1804 in Huntingdon County, PA, the son of JOHN HECKENDORN and ANNA MARIA PETERMAN. HENRY married HARRIET CHANDLER 2 Jun 1828 in Huntingdon Borough, PA. In the 1830 census he was in Beaver County, PA, with one son, less than 10 years old, JOHN N. HECKENDORN. In 1840 he was in Porter Township, Jefferson County with HARRIET, his wife, two sons and two daughters. In 1850 he is a farmer in Perry Township, Jefferson County with HARRIET, and children: THOMAS J., HARRIET A., HENRY B. and WILLIAM A. MARY ELIZA-BETH and JOHN N. are married and in homes of their own.

In the 1860 census HENRY, a wheelwright, was living in Brookville and had a new wife, MARY (BARR) LYLE, two LYLE children and WILLIAM A. The 1870 census lists HENRY as a wagon maker, with MARY, WILLIAM A. and a grandson, ARCH McMURRAY. HENRY is missing from the 1880 census and presumed dead. MARY LYLE born 22 Sep 1810, died 10 Mar 1908 and is buried in Clover Township. The graves of HENRY and HARRIET have not been located. The graves of JOHN N., HENRY B. and WILLIAM A., all Civil War Veterans, have been identified in "Tombstone Hoppin', Cemetery Inscriptions of Jefferson County, PA. His heirs settled his estate 21 June 1880.

HENRY in his own family was referred to as HARRY ALEXANDER HECKENDORN. Many of his grandsons and greatgrandsons bear the name HARRY rather than HENRY.

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JOHN MCFEATERS AND HANNAH

The tombstone of JOHN McFEATERS in Harmony Cemetery, Penn Run, PA indicates that he was born 30 Dec 1779 and died in Cherry Hill Township, Indiana County, PA 16 May 1860 AE 80y 4m 10d. On an adjacent tombstone we find HANNAH born 12 Feb 1780 and died 7 Jan 1855, AE 74y 10m 26d.

In the 1880 census their sons, ANDREW and MARK stated that both parents were born in Pennsylvania. This is contrary to a Westmoreland County History which said JOHN came from Ireland. However, ANDREW and MARK were close to their father and their statements indicate that the parents of JOHN and HANNAH came to Pennsylvania before 1780.

Most of the children of JOHN and HANNAH were born in the Tuscarora Valley of Mifflin County, PA prior to their move to Wheatfield Township, Indiana County, PA in 1816.

Immediately after HANNAH's death JOHN wrote his will, 24 Feb 1855, and listed his nine children in order of their birth. "I, JOHN McFEATERS, of Green Township Indiana County and State of Pennsylvania being weak of body but of a sound mind and memory thanks be to God for the same. lelizing (sic) this I do make my last will as follows. I first dive and bequeath unto my son JAMES McFEATERS the sum of thirty dollars and give unto my son WILLIAM McFEATERS the sum of thirty dollars and give unto my son JOHN McFEATERS hears (sic) the sum of thirty dollars and give unto my daughter MARY GRAHAM one hundred dollars. I give unto NATHANIEL BRYAN and HANNAH his wife the sum of one hundred dollars and give and bequeath unto my son ANDREW McFEATERS the sum of thirty dollars and give and bequeath unto THOMAS STEPHENS and NANCY his wife the sum of one hundred dollars and it is my will that my sons RDBERT McFEATERS and MARK McFEATERS pay all my just debts and funeral expenses and I appoint my sons ROBERT McFEATERS and MARK McFEATERS my lawful executors this my last will and testiment (sic) witness my hand and seal the twenty-fourth day of February AD 1855.

JDHN McFEATERS (seal) We the subscribers as witnesses did subscribe our names as witnesses in his one (sic) present (sic) at his one (sic) requiz (sic)

JAMES STEWART JOHN GAYSTEN ROBERT SIMPSON

MARY McFEATERS GRAHAM was already a widow. WILLIAM GRAHAM had died in 1853. The will indicates that the son, JOHN McFEATERS is also deceased. In the partition petition

of RDBERT McFEATERS' estate only JAMES and MARK are living, the other children are dead.

JOHN GRAHAM, JR. AND REBECCA STEPHENS

JOHN GRAHAM, JR. born about 1790 in Bedford County, the son of JDHN GRAHAM, SR. and ANN HENRY. He moved to Wheatfield Township, Indiana County, PA about 1803 with his parents. From this area Pine Township was erected in 1850 and Buffington Township in 1867. JOHN died before 4 Oct 1833 when his will was proven. He is buried in the Salem Cemetery in what is now Brush Valley Township beside his sons JOSEPH and JOHN and his brother, WILLIAM. His stone has no dates inscribed but is adjacent to those of his parents.

REBECCA STEPHENS was the daughter of SAMUEL STEPHENS and MIRIAM PITMAN, born 25 Jun 1800 in Wheatfield Township, Westmoreland County. This area became Indiana County in 1803. She died 16 May 1874.

JAMES MOORHEAD, JR. AND BARBARA KISSINGER

JAMES MOORHEAD, JR. married BARBARA before 1820. She is reported to have been a widow with a daughter "POLLY' (MARY) KISSINGER who supposedly married DAVID FORD. JAMES did not mention POLLY in his will. Only DAVID MOORHEAD AND LYDIA ANN MOORHEAD were designated heirs.

JAMES MOORHEAD, JR. was born in Antrim Township, Cumberland County, PA about 1770-1775 and died in Washington Township, Franklin County, PA without moving from the original home plantation. Antrim Township was formed in Lancaster County, PA and that area became Cumberland County in 1750. Antrim Township was subdivided into seven townships one of which was Washington Township formed in 1779. All seven Townships were in the area designated Franklin County when it was erected in 1784.

The two children of JAMES had a double wedding ceremony on 14 Aug 1839 when DAVID MOORHEAD and LYDIA HAHN and LYDIA ANN MOORHEAD and LEWIS RHA were married by Dr. GEORGE WASHI-NGTON GLESSNER. The ceremony was performed in the German Reformed Church of Waynesboro in Franklin County, PA.

LYDIA ANN and LEWIS RHA had eleven children listed in various census schedules and in the Union Church Cemetery, Wasynesboro, PA.

JOHN HAHN, BUTCHER, OF MARYLAND, PENNSYLVANIA AND INDIANA

JOHN HAHN is a man of mystery. We do not know the name of his parents, his wife, or where any of them were born, or when or where they died or when and where he died.

My mother had two souvenirs of the HAHN family, these are now in my possession. A wooden butter print, with a design carved in the lid with a maltese cross in one corner to cover up a slip of the carver's knife, which my mother used as a jewel box. In it was a note in her handwriting written in the 1930's, viz, "HAHN's settled in Franklin County, PA. Butter print 200 yrs. old or more bro't from Germany by HAHN family my great-great-grandparents. gave to me by my grandma LYDIA HAHN MOORHEAD." The second momento is a small toleware cream pitcher which KATHRYN MOORHEAD, daughter of SAMUEL NEWTON MOORHEAD, my mother's cousin gave to my mother about 1935. KATHRYN placed a note in the creamer which said, viz, "My great-great-grandmother HAHN cream pitcher, 233 years old her first dishes when she went to housekeeping about 1690 (all tin)."

These dates are confusing. The grandmother, LYDIA HAHN MODRHEAD, was born in 1818 and a great-great-grandmother, two generations older would have been born about 1750. The 1690 date is off by about 70 years (two generations). The HAHNS may have come as late as 1790 which must have been about the birth date of the patriarch of this chapter. They probably came in the mid 1700's prior to the Revolution.

LYDIA HAHN MOORHEAD was reputed to have been born in Maryland by some of her children (1880 census) and "in The Cove" by others. This is an inconsistancy since the "Little Cove" is now in Franklin County, PA but was in Bedford County prior to the erection of Fulton County from Bedford County in 1850. The "Big Cove" is north of the "Little Cove" and is in what is now Fulton County, PA.

Family tradition indicates that JOHN HAHN was a butcher who lived in the Hagerstown, MD-Waynesboro, PA area from about 1810 until in the 1830's Sometime after the death of his first wife he removed to the State of Indiana, married a second wife and raised a second family in the State of Indiana.

We find that he from Warren County, Dhio sold land, "Father's Goodwill" in Ridgeville, Washington County, MD, between Smithsburg, MD and Waynesburg (sic, Waynesboro PA) to his son DAVID HAHN on 20 Feb 1838 for \$300. No wife was mentioned or examined. The deed was recorded 6 March 1838. On 12 March 1836, JOHN HAHN of Washington County, MD pur-

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chased from JONATHAN FEIGLEY "Father's Good Will" and on the same day sold to FEIGLEY "Hawk's Delight." Blanks were left for the name of HAHN's wife but no name was entered and no examination of a wife took place. Hence we can assume that JOHN's wife was dead prior to March 1836, that he is still in the area but by March 1838 he is in Ohio. My mother's records indicate that he removed to Perry Township, State of Indiana. No county was indicated and there are fourteen counties in Indiana with a Perry Township.

IRA V. MOORHEAD had indicated that JOHN HAHN's first wife was possibly a STONER. Interestingly enough JOHN STONER held the original patent for "Father's Good Will" and after his death his heir, JOHN STONER, JR. gave an indenture to his brothers DAVID and ABRAHAM STONER of Frederick County, MD for this property. On 1 Sep 1774 DAVID STONER obtained a patent for "Father's Good Will" from the province of Maryland.

In the 1930's my mother was in communication with MAY HAHN, the relict of DRVILLE HAHN of the second family. She, also, wrote a list of her HAHN relatives, viz,:

My mother inserted an extra great in the great-grandfather title. She also listed some second cousins as great aunts possibly because they were a generation older than she.

This truly is a man of mystery. In "The Visitor," newspaper of Mercersburg, Montgomery Township, Franklin County, PA, an advertisement, 4 Oct 1844. "List of letters in the Post Office, EZRA S. HAHN" In the National Archives we find an EZRA HAHN who enlisted at Chambersburg, 20 Mar 1865. Remarks, "Drafted from Mt. Joy Township, Adams County, PA." A check of the post-war records of Adams County shows no reason to believe that he is a son of our JOHN HAHN. Several nephews were named in his honor, i.e., EZRA VERNON HAHN, JOHN EZRA HAHN, etc.

d. 18 Sep 1889, Green Hill Cem., Waynesboro, PA m. 26 Feb 1839, SUSANNA ROWE, She, 1817-1898. David is listed as a house carpenter in the 1850 census. He was, also, heavily involved in real estate transactions. About 20-30 deeds are recorded over the ensuing years but he eventually went bankrupt and was forced to turn over all of his real estate to an administrator to clear his creditors. Two of his sons raised large families in Waynesboro and some of his descendants live there today.

30.4 SUSANNAH HAHN

b. 4 Jul 1816 d. 5 Jan 1834, AE 17y 6m 1d The only reference is her tombstone in Green Hill Cemetery in the HAHN plot adjacent to her older brother, DAVID HAHN.

LYDIA A. PITKIN and LUCINDA BANKERT were daughters

of WILLIAM FOX and LEAH HAHN. Their son DAVID FOX married ANNA S. MARTIN. The marriage listed on the family group sheet is believed to be correct. This is the ANNIE FOX on my mother's list of "Great Aunts."

Using the 1900 and 1910 Soundex the three children of the second family have been identified.

Their son was named EZRA VERNON HAHN in honor of ORVILLE'S older half-brother. MAY in her letters to my mother always referred to him as VERNON. His last known address: E. 

REUBEN HICKOX I AND ELIZABETH SICKLES

REUBEN married ELIZABETH SICKLES about 1785 based on the age of the oldest child. REUBEN was born 15 December 1760 in Waterbury, CT to JOHN HICKOX II and EUNICE WARNER. ELIZABETH's family has not been identified but it is of dutch ancestry from either the Hudson Valley of New York or the Berkshires in the Great Barrington area of Massachusetts.

REUBEN's parents lived in Great Barrington, MA until about 1775. When REUBEN was 14 his father died on a business trip to New Orleans. JOHN is listed as having been buried on "New Orland Island" on the way home. This vague description suggests that he died and was buried on the Isle of Orleans, the site of New Orleans. On 15 April 1776 EUNICE WARNER HICKOX married THOMAS RICHASON (RICHARDSON) a widower.

On 2 April 1776 DAVID WARNER, a brother of EUNICE WARNER HICKOX, gave bond and became the guardian of REUBEN. DAVID lived in Waterbury, CT. REUBEN may have resented the proposed stepfather.

The obituary of REUBEN II the fourth child of REUBEN I gives additional information. "Mr. HICKOX's father was a soldier in the Revolution under General Washington in his northern campaigns, and died like his son at a ripe old age -- 90 years." Hence REUBEN must have died about 1850. We know that his death preceeded that of ELIZABETH from the family bible of their oldest son, JAMES HENRY HICKOX. REUBEN served as a private in Captain ISRAIL HARRIS' Company, Col. BENJAMIN SIMOND's Berkshire County Regiment and marched to the Northern Frontiers on two alarms in October 1780. He served 12 days in November 1781 in Lt. ALEXANDER SLOAN's detachment which marched from Berkshire County to the Northern Frontier on an Alarm.

JAMES HENRY HICKOX made a deposition, #19447, in 1842 in the New Haven Probate District on the estate of JDHN HICKOX, viz., "I JAMES H. HICKOX of the City and County of New Haven being duly sworn depose and say that I am the son of REUBEN HICKOX, that JDHN HICKOX who was a soldier and was killed in the last war was a brother of mine and that the only brothers and sisters that said JDHN dec'd ever had, were DANIEL, DAVID, REUBEN, BENJAMIN, EDWARD M., RICHARD, LEONARD, LYDIA and MARGARET and myself. That said LYDIA has married JOSEPH GIFFRIN and MARGARET has married A. PERKINS -- all of whom are heirs at Law of said JDHN dec'd. New Haven, March 31st 1842 JAMES H. HICKOX"

This deposition and the Family Bible of the JAMES H.

HICKOX family are in the Connecticut State Archives in Hartford, Ct. JOSEPH D. HICKOX in his book, "The HICKOX GENEALOGY," stated that REUBEN was the fourth child. Using the data in the 1790, 1800 and 1810 census for REUBEN's family and using the names of the children in the 1850 census we can identify the members of this family with some degree of confidence.

He served as private in Captain NEWHALL TAINTOR's Company, Connecticut Detached Militia in 1814.

b. c 1794 in CT He, a shoemaker, his wife, MARY age 47 and a son DWIGHT L. HICKOX are listed in the 1850 census. He served as a private in Captain ABRAHAM HUBBARD's Company, Detatched Regiment Connecticut Militia in 1813. In 1850 he is living in Southbury, CT. 40.6 JOHN HICKOX

b. c. 1795 d. 27 May 1813, killed in action. He enlisted for six years 3 March 1813 and served in the U. S. Grays under Captain HARRIS.

The REUBEN HICKOX family of New Haven County, CT in the 1800 census listed four sons and only one daughter.

- 40.7 MARGARET HICKOX appears in the 1810 census as less than 10 years of age. She probably was born about 1801. She married A. PERKINS.
- 40.8 EDWARD M. HICKOX, age 47, mason, born in CT in 1803 with his wife, SALLY, age 46 born in PA and three childre: JAMES, HENRY and HENRIETTA all born in NY are listed in the 1850 census as living in Rock Island City, Illinois.

There is an EDWARD HICKOX, age 56, farmer born in CT with wife, ANNA, and a daughter and two grandchildren living in Watertown, Litchfield County, CT. The location is good but he doesn't fit the census and war service pattern nor the requirement of a middle initial, M.

40.9 BENJAMIN HICKOX. We have three candidates. A BENJAMIN HEACOX, age 54 (born 1794) foundryman born in CT with a wife, ELIZABETH, and four children living in Ligonier, Westmoreland County, PA.

A BENJAMIN HICKOX, age 51, physician, born in 1799 in CT with wife CATHERINE, and six children born in PA, NY and OH living in Shalerville, Portage County, OH in the 1850 census.

Also, a BENJAMIN HICKOX, age 45, born in 1805 in CT. He is listed as a Patent Vendor living in a hotel in the 9th Ward, Cincinnati, OH. He is the best candidate.

- 40.10 RICHARD HECDX, a farmer age 44 born about 1806 with wife, EUNICE age 44, and six children born in PA and IN are listed as living in Aboite Township, Allen County, IN in the 1850 census.
- 40.11 DAVID HICKOX, a farmer age 36, born in CT and living in New Haven County at Southbury with his wife, HANNAH, born 1830, BENJAMIN b. 1848 and Elizabeth b. 1850 is our best candidate.

DAVID HICKOX, farmer age 41 born in NY about 1809

with his wife, AMY, born in 1811 in NY, and four children: SAMUEL, DANIEL, DAVID and ALBERT, all born in NY are living in Otsego Township, Otsego County, NY in 1850. Living with DAVID is ELIZABETH HICKOX, age 82 years. This is a birth date of 1768, JOSEPH D. HICKOX stated that ELIZABETH was 85 years old at death which would indicate a birth date of 1766. The names of three sons fit the family name pattern. In the JAMES HENRY HICKOX Family Bible "ELIZABETH, relic (sic) of REUBEN died 6 July 1851 in Illinois." Since the DAVID HICKOX family does not appear in the 1860 census in Otsego County it is possible that the family was migrating to the west and ELIZABETH died on the trip either with this family or with the EDWARD M. HECOCK family in Rock Island City, IL. However, I believe this ELIZABETH is the relict of SAMUEL HICKOX who was listed in the 1840 census of Otsego County, NY next door to this DAVID.

THOMAS WILLIAMS II AND MARIA QUICK

THOMAS was born in New Jersey about 1776 based on his 1850 census entry and the 1880 census statements of several of his children. He was the son of THOMAS WILLIAMS I and SARAH, his wife. He died before 26 March 1856, on that date a citation was issued by the Registrar of Jefferson County, PA. A grand-daughter born 3 March 1856 stated that when she was 3 days old her father's house burned to the ground. This was reported by the Punxsutawney Pa newspaper as the coldest day on record. The ice on the Susquehanna River at Harrisburg was three feet thick. THOMAS may have perished in the fire or suffered from exposure and died soon thereafter.

The citation served 26 March 1856 on CATHERINE HICOX (sic), ALMIRA A. FOSTER, S. B. WILLIAMS, J. N. WILLIAMS and PHOEBE J. MORRIS shows that five children were not served and were elsewhere at this time. Letters of administration were then issued to J. M. MORRIS, son-in-law. Those not served were: DEBORAH HORTON, who had kept house for her father for many years; MARY WILLIAMS WEST, living in New York; THDMAS WILLIAMS, JR., also living in NY; JOHN K. WILLIAMS was served although he was living in New York; HIRAM P. WILLIAMS, whose house and all possessions were destroyed by fire on 6 March and SAMUEL WILLIAMS.

MARIA QUICK, the daughter of JOHN (JOHANNES) QUICK and his wife, MARY GEORGE, was born in Mamakating Township, Ulster County, NY 6 May 1771. The 1820 census indicates that she was less than 45 years old and therefore born after 1 Jan 1775; the 1800 and 1810 census indicates that she was born 1774-1784. She married THDMAS about 1795 and their first child, DEBORAH, was born 11 April 1798. MARIA died 12 March 1829 apparently in Sullivan County, NY although neither grave nor obituary have been discovered. She and THOMAS raised eleven children.

CATHERINE WILLIAMS, the second daughter, married REUBEN HICKOX II and they moved about 1823 to Jefferson County, PA. THOMAS and his five younger children moved to Jefferson County about 1830. He has not been located in the 1830 census. The families of these younger children are well described in "A Williams Chronicle," by Frances H. Ehrig. The families of MARY WILLIAMS WEST and JOHN K. WILLIAMS were not covered in that book.

Church, cemetery and census records indicate that these two older children had married and established families in Sullivan County prior to the move of THDMAS to Jefferson County, PA. From the tombstone of MARY WILLIAMS WEST and SAMUEL WEST in the Eldred Cemetery (NY) MARY was the third child and third daughter of THOMAS and MARIA. She was born in 1801 and when she died in 1897 was the oldest member of her church and resident of Lumberland, Sullivan County, NY. Church and census records show that she had at least eight children. The tombstone of MARY and SAMUEL had been toppled face down by a small tree. My wife and I were able to raise the stone and turn it over to read the dates.

JOHN K. WILLIAMS owned considerable acerage in Sullivan County. His first wife and mother of his children was CLARI-SSA H. REED who died in 1860. When he married a second time he selected a woman also named CLARISSA (1880 census) but eight years younger. JOHN, CLARISSA H. and three of their children, who died young, are buried in the Forestburgh Cemetery, Thompson Township, Sullivan County, NY.

JOHN (JOHANNES) HECKENDORN AND ANNA MARIA PETERMAN

JOHN HECKENDORN, reedmaker and farmer, was born 23 Dec 1773 in York, York County, PA. He died 16 May 1860 in West Township, Huntingdon County, PA and was buried from the German Reformed Church of Alexandria in the Waterstreet Cemetery. He married ANNA MARIA PETERMAN about 1795 in York County. On 1 Oct 1796 JOHN and ANNA MARIA, his wife, sold land in Manchester Township, York County. They first lived in Bottstown, the western end of York, PA.

JOHN in Dec 1794 petitioned the Orphans Court of York County for a settlement of his father's estate. The land was valued at 1207 pounds one shilling and eight pence. The Court awarded him the land and credited him with 342 pounds one shilling and four pence for his two shares as eldest son and heir-at-law of his father. "That he pay unto ELIZABETH. CHRISTIAN, ANNA MARIA and ROZINA (sic) HECKENDORN and to each and every one of them respectively in one year from this date the sum of one hundred and seventy-one pounds and eight pence lawful money of Pennsylvania in full for their respective shares of the said valuation as children of the intestate." JOHN received one-hundred-ninety-eight said acres and 150 perches in one lot and an undivided molety of half in another plantation also in Windsor Township containing one-hundred-sixty acres and ninety perches.

In the 1800 census JOHN HECKENDORN, a wife and one daughter appear in Huntingdon Borough, Huntingdon County, PA. NATHANIEL, born 25 Jun 1796, and named for his uncle who died in 1794-5, died in 1797. The 1810 census finds the family in Dublin Township and 1820 in Porter Township, Huntingdon County with two boys and four girls. In 1830 JOHN and two daughters are in St. Clair Township, Bedford County, Pa. In 1840 JOHN, 60-70 years old, is living alone in West Township. In the 1850 census he is living with his daughter, ANNA MARY, and son-in-law, SAMUEL DANIEL CONRAD, in West Township, Huntingdon County, PA.



JEREMIAH NELSON CHANDLER AND SARAH JOHNSTON

JEREMIAH NELSON CHANDLER was born in Norfolk, VA. 1782-1784, the son of Lt. JEREMIAH H. CHANDLER and MARY (ARMI-TAGE) KENNEDY, the widow of (?) KENNEDY. It is possible the H. is a misinterpretation of N. for Nelson in which case the father should be designated Sr. They were married 18 Jun 1781 in Swede's Church, Philadelphia, PA. JEREMIAH NELSON CHANDLER died p. 1834. He was last found in the 1830 census and the 1834 Tax Lists for Porter Township, Huntingdon County, PA.

He married SARAH JDHNSTON a. 6 Jul 1807, c. 1806, the daughter of Captain THOMAS JOHNSTON and MARY PATTON of Porter Township. SARAH died p. 1830. We have not located her after the 1830 census. Their oldest son, THOMAS JOHNSTON CHANDLER, stated that "JEREMIAH was trained as a doctor but never practiced." However, we find in the Account Book of Bucher and Porter, merchants of Alexandria, entries that indicate part of JEREMIAH's account was paid by Porter Township for his attendance on EVAN ROBERTS. These accounts show rather large purchases of whiskey, sugar, molasses and some worn seed and castor oil. It is possible that JEREMIAH was in the patent medicine business with tonics and cough syrups. Whiskey sold for 12.5 cents per quart!

Mrs. MARY CHANDLER married her third husband, MOSES INGRAHAM PIERCE, in Norfolk, VA, 5 Jul 1787. In the 1790 census she, MARY PAICE (sic), is living two houses from her father, JAMES ARMITAGE, in Huntingdon County with two boys under sixteen years of age, viz., JDHN KENNEDY and JEREMIAH CHANDLER. In the 1800 census we find MARY PIERCE, over 45; a woman, 16-26 years; a girl under 10 and two young men 16-26 in Huntingdon County living near JAMES ARMITAGE. In the 1810 census in Bedford County, Bedford Township the head of the family is listed in the Jackson Index as JEREMIAH H. CHAN-DLER, 16-26. However, on close inspection of the film it is obvious that the indexer misread an N. and called it H. MARY PIERCE is the woman over 45, two women 16-26 (one is definitely SARAH JOHNSTON CHANDLER), a boy under 10 is THOMAS JOHNSTON CHANDLER and a girl under 10 is HARRIET CHANDLER. There are several person listed which are not identifieable, viz., a man over 45, a man 16-26 could be JOHN KENNEDY, a woman 16-26 could be JUDITH KENNEDY, a woman 26-45, a boy 10-16 and a girl under 10. MARY had purchased "Carrigans" in 1804 in Bedford Township, Bedford County. In 1812 Napier Township was erected from Bedford Township. In 1811 JERE-MIAH was licensed as an Innkeeper in Bedford County.

On 6 July 1807 MARY PIERCE, JOHN KENNEDY, JEREMIAH CHANDLER and SARAH, his wife, conveyed land in Franklin and Warrior's Mark Townships, Huntingdon County to JDHN GLDNIN-GER. This land had been given to MARY by her father, JAMES ARMITAGE, in his will of 15 Jul 1801. However, he conveyed one fourth part of all his land to MARY during her life time and on her death to her heirs, JDHN KENNEDY and JEREMIAH CHANDLER.

JOHN KENNEDY, as the oldest son, was granted letters of administration 3 April 1813 for the estate of MARY PIERCE, late of Napier Township, dec'd. The vendue sale was 20 Mar 1813 and the inventory was filed 3 April. JOHN had been admitted to the bar in Bedford County in 1810. On 7 Jun 1813 JEREMIAH N. CHANDLER and SARAH, his wife, entitled to an undivided moiety of half part of the land "Carrigans," Napier Township (193 acres) granted to JOHN KENNEDY the only other heir, their attorney, power to execute a conveyance. JOHN completed the conveyance to CASPAR STOTLER, Innkeeper, on 10 Jun 1813.

In the 1820 census, Porter Township, Huntingdon County, PA we find JEREMIAH CHANDLER; SARAH; two boys under 10, sons "X" and "Y;" a girl 10-16, HARRIET; and a girl under 10, SARAH. JOHN KENNEDY's family is also living in Alexandria and consists of JUDITH, one boy under 10 and two girls under 10 years of age.

In 1830 NELSON CHANDLER is in Alexandria, PA with SARAH: two girls 10-15, SARAH and ELIZABETH; one girl 5-10, CATHERINE SUSAN; one boy 10-15, "Y." HARRIET married HENRY HECKENDORN 2 Jun 1828 and is living in Beaver County, PA; and THOMAS JOHNSTON CHANDLER married ELIZA J. SHERMAN 28 Aug 1829. He is living in Alexandria next door to his uncle, JOHN KENNEDY. The KENNEDY family listed one boy under 5, one 5-10, one 10-15, one girl 5-10 and 2 girls 10-15 with JOHN, 40-50 and JUDITH, 40-50. The THOMAS CHANDLER family consisted of THOMAS, 20-30 and ELIZA, 15-20. In the 1834 Tax Lists for Porter Township THOMAS is taxed for an occupation and one lot. JEREMIAH was taxed only for an occupation but JDHN KENNEDY was taxed for a cow, an occupation, three houses and three lots, numbers 89-91, in Alexandria. THOMAS is renting one of the houses in 1830 but JEREMIAH is renting in another part of town.

JEREMIAH purchased lot No. 50 in Alexandria from ANDREW MAGEE 25 May 1815 for \$318. He was on the Porter Township Tax Lists as early as 1814. In Feb 1819 lot No. 50 with a house was sold at Sheriff's Sale to CONRAD BUCHER for \$145. BOUCHER immediately endorsed the deed to JOHNSTON PATTERSON. BUCHER evidently bought this for less than its worth to get his money owed by JEREMIAH. Thus JEREMIAH only had the property two years. His inheritance from MARY PIERCE and his grandfather, JAMES ARMITAGE, was gone. His fortunes appeared to ebb and flow. Sometimes he had as much as a house and lot, a shop, a horse and a cow. Other times he had only a cow. In 1831 none of the CHANDLERS were taxed but on the list of "poor children" whose school books were to be provided by the Township were SARAH CHANDLER, aged 11 and CATHERINE CHANDLER, aged 6. We do not know where ELIZABETH went since she is not mentioned. That may have been the low ebb as this was the only year they were listed. In 1832 both JEREMIAH and THOMAS were taxed as married men with THOMAS having a shop. Both THOMAS and JEREMIAH disappear from the Tax Lists after 1834. JEREMIAH and SARAH disappear after 1834. Where they went and where they died we do not know.

CATHERINE SUSAN CHANDLER married JAMES A. FULLERTON of Brookville, PA. CATHERINE's older sister, HARRIET HECKENDORN lived near Brookville but died between 1850 and 1860. In the 1850 census JAMES A. FULLERTON AND HIS WIFE, SUSAN C., age 25, lived with his mother SUSAN FULLERTON, age 69, JAMES D., age 3, and SARAH C., age 3 months. (See Appendix p. 249).

SARAH R. CHANDLER married ABRAHAM HAYS. In the 1850 census of Allegheny County, Mifflin Township we find ABRA-HAM, age 30; SARAH, age 32; ELMIRA, age 13; and STEWARD, age In 1860 at the same location we find ABRAHAM, 50, Cap-11. tain of a tow boat; SARAH, 51; ELMIRA, 22; SEWARD, 20, pilot of a tow boat. In 1870 in Allegheny County we find ABRAHAM HAYS, 61, farmer; SARAH, 62; and SEWARD. 30, Steam Boat man. In 1880 ABRAHAM, 70, farmer, Mifflin Township, Allegheny County; SARAH, 72; SEWARD, Steam Boat Captain, 40 and FLORA B., his wife, age 27. Also, in 1880 in Westmoreland County, East Huntingdon Township we find that ABRAHAM and SARAH are listed as having a farm with tenant farmers, they were counted twice. Between 1850 and 1860 ABRAHAM and SARAH 20 years in age. The enumerator probably was not advance good at arithmetic.

ELIZABETH CHANDLER, born 1822-3 in Huntingdon County was last seen in the 1830 census. She was not on the Tax List as a "poor child" in 1831. We finally find her in New Orleans, LA 17 April 1848 when her marriage to Senor JOSE MANUEL VIDAL, b. 1814 in Galicia, Spain was blessed in the Cathedral. ELIZABETH died 11 Dec 1861 in New Orleans and JOSE died 22 Jun 1867 leaving three small girls. The daughters were: ROSALIE VIDAL, b. 1 Feb 1847, m. HENRY HEMEL 25 Jan 1866 and died 5 May 1874 in New Orleans; MANUELITA, b. 22 Jan 1844 married 1865 EDWARD BINDERNAGEL, died 27 April 1912 in New Orleans; and MARIA VICTORIA, b. 22 Feb 1849 in New Orleans. MANUELITA was the only one of the three named in their uncle's, THOMAS JOHNSTON CHANDLER, will.

THOMAS JOHNSTON CHANDLER, b. 17 Aug 1807 in Bedford County, PA, married ELIZA JANE SHERMAN 28 Aug 1829 in Huntingdon County. He was first a silversmith and later a tailor. He began the study of dentistry in Alexandria but moved to Rochester, Beaver County, PA about 1834 and practiced dentistry until his retirement in 1883. He and ELIZA had eleven children and in addition adopted another daughter. Three of their four sons became dentists, viz., WILLIAM JOHNSTON, HENRY BASCOM and HARRISON JOHNSTON CHANDLER.

THOMAS in his will made 26 Dec 1881 and proven 30 Mar 1896, remembered his children, his wife, MANUELITA VIDAL (daughter of his sister, ELIZABETH), his adopted daughter, his two surviving sisters: SARAH R. HAYS of Pittsburgh and CATHERINE SUSAN FULLERTON of Brookville. Three of his children were not mentioned and probably died young, i.e., LILLIAN, LARONKA and HENRY, born in 1860 about the time of the POSSIBLE death of an older son, HENRY BASCOM CHANDLER. There is a possibility that the HENRY born in 1860 is a son of HENRY BASCOM CHANDLER and therefore a grandson of THOMAS CHANDLER.

JOHN GRAHAM, SR. AND ANN HENRY

JOHN GRAHAM, SR., born about 1756, probably in northern Ireland, died 24 May 1836 and is buried in the Salem Cemetery in what is now Brush Valley Township, Indiana County, PA. This cemetery is on what was designated as the McCartney Farm and is sometimes referred to as the McCartney Cemetery.

JDHN served in the Bedford County Associators in 1776, in various Ranger Companies of the Bedford County Militia, 1778-1783 and received Depreciation Pay for his services from Bedford County. He secured warrants for land in Bedford County, 170 acres, 1788; and 400 acres in 1793. In 1803 he secured a warrant for land in Wheatfield Township, Indiana County, the year the county was erected from Westmoreland County. Westmoreland County continued to supply judicial and tax services for the area for two or three years.

ANN HENRY, born about 1766, the daughter of JOHN HENRY, died 2 Jan 1841 in Wheatfield Township, Indiana County, She is buried in the Salem Cemetery, now Brush Valley Township. ANN and JOHN were married probably in Bedford County where their first child was born in 1783. According to the 1800 census for Bedford County, the JOHN GRAHAM family consisted of JOHN, ANN, two boys under 10 years, one boy 10-16 years, and two girls under 10 years. Between 1800 and 1810 three girls and one boy were added to the family, some being born in Wheatfield Township.

SAMUEL STEPHENS AND HIS WIVES MIRIAM PITMAN - CATHERINE MCCARTNEY - FRANCES THOMPSON

SAMUEL STEPHENS was born 2 Feb 1769 in an area of Cumberland County, PA which became Bedford County in 1771. He was the son of BENJAMIN STEPHENS and REBECCA CALDWELL. He married MIRIAM PITMAN, the daughter of JDSEPH PITMAN and his wife, MIRIAM, in 1793 in Morrison's Cove, Bedford County, PA. They came over the mountain on horseback with their cattle and household goods and located near the present town of Brush Valley in Wheatfield Township, Westmoreland County, PA. In 1803 this area became Indiana County. Two of SAMUEL's brothers, THOMAS and JDHN, came with them to help raise the cabin and clear the land. Nine children were born here and when the youngest, JDSEPH, was but two hours old, MIRIAM died, 18 Dec 1809. She is buried on the farm.

After MIRIAM's death SAMUEL moved to another farm near Dilltown on Blacklick Creek and married CATHERINE GALBREATH McCARTNEY in 1811. She died in May 1825 after bearing eight children and is buried in the McCartney Cemetery later designated East Union Cemetery.

In Feb 1826 SAMUEL married FRANCES THOMPSON. On 1 Apr 1830 SAMUEL, his wife, three of their children and ESTEP, a son of his second marriage, set out for the fertile lands in the state of Indiana which his brothers, WILLIAM, RICHARD and BENJAMIN, JR. had vividly described. They drove the old stone pike to Pittsburgh, took a boat to Cincinnati and built a raft to float down the Dhio River and located in Rush County, Indiana where SAMUEL took out two farms.

SAMUEL died 23 Mar 1843 and is buried on his farm. FRANCES died 12 Mar 1886. By his three wives he had a total of thirty-two children but four apparently died too early to be named.

JAMES MOORHEAD, SR. AND LYDIA JONES

JAMES MOORHEAD, SR. married LYDIA JONES in the First Presbyterian Church of Philadelphia, PA 11 May 1761. From this union eight children were born. He served in Captain WILLIAM FINDLEY'S 7th Company, 8th Battalion, Cumberland County Militia in the Revolutionary War.

JAMES MOORHEAD, SR. in his will written 14 Sep 1804 appointed his "three beloved sons: JDHN, JAMES and ISAAC" executors of his estate and stated that "the whole of my estate real and personal to be equally divided between them share and share alike" and that they pay equal parts and portions of all legacies, debts and encumberances. The first legacy is to my "beloved son, THOMAS, one hundred pounds and the priviledge of fire wood for his home and calling so long as the land remains in the hands of his brothers." "Each of my beloved daughters: MARGRET, ANN, SARAH and REBECCA to receive one pound each." His will was proven 9 Aug 1816 and on 31 Dec 1816 JAMES and ISAAC MODRHEAD swore to execute the will and settle the estate within the year. JOHN did not serve as executor of his father's will. He moved to Redbank Township, Armstrong County, PA.

On 31 May 1815 JAMES MOORHEAD, SR. deeded to JAMES MOORHEAD, JR. for \$100. the plantation where JAMES MOORHEAD, SR. then lived, 220 acres, 63 perches "the same being that tract of land which JAMES JOHNSTON, executor of the last will and testament of JOHN MOORHEAD, deceased, did by indenture 11 Jun 1777 convey to JAMES MOORHEAD."

On 24 May 1817 JAMES MODRHEAD, JR. of Washington Township did convey by indenture to his brother, ISAAC, 113 acres 52 perches of the home plantation. Also, by indenture on the same date he conveyed 5 acres of the plantation to his brother, THOMAS. This reduced the home plantation to about 100 acres for JAMES, JR.

ISAAC MOORHEAD and ELIZABETH, his wife, did by an indenture 5 Aug 1811 sell to his brother, THOMAS MOORHEAD, three lots in Waynesburgh (sic, Waynesboro). There we find THOMAS MOORHEAD living in Waynesboro in the 1860 and 1870 census.

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JOHN HICKOX II AND EUNICE WARNER

JOHN HICKOX II, son of JOHN HICKOX I and MARY GAYLORD was born at Wallingford, CT, 1 July 1734. He was baptized at Meriden, 7 July 1734 and died 21 Nov 1774. He married 1 Jun 1754 EUNICE WARNER, born 2 Aug 1740 at Waterbury, CT, the daughter of Dr. BENJAMIN WARNER and HANNAH or JOHANNA STRONG.

JOHN and EUNICE lived in Great Barrington, MA from at least 1771 until about 1775. Three of their children were born and baptized in Great Barrington. A cousin, JOHN HICKOX married to ANNE WARNER, a sister of EUNICE WARNER, was living in Great Barrington at the same time.

JOHN died on New Orland (sic) Island on his way home from New Orleans. There is a remote possibility that this refers to the location of New Orleans. EUNICE then married THOMAS RICHASON (RICHARDSON) who was born 7 Dec 1720, the son of ERENEZER RICHARDSON. They had three children. JOHN's estate was valued at \$8,000.

THOMAS WILLIAMS I AND SARAH

THOMAS WILLIAMS I is said to have been born 5 Jun 1743 in that area of Pennsylvania that is now Huntingdon County. In 1743 the area was Lancaster County and by 1750, Cumberland County. His wife is listed only as SARAH. At one time in the Daughters of the American Revolution records the surname HUBLER was inadvertantly added.

His pension records indicate that he enlisted at the Redstone Settlement on the Monongahela River in Westmoreland County, PA. This area was also claimed by Virginia and there were two County seats and two sets of records for this area. He enlisted in the fall of 1776 in what soon was designated the Eighth Pennsylvania Regiment of the Continental Line. This organization consisted of seven companies of riflemen from Westmoreland County and one company from Bedford Coun-It was authorized 15 July for the specific purpose of tv. manning Presque Isle, Le Boef and Kittannning. The Convention of Pennsylvania recommended Col. AENEAS MacKAY (McCDY), Col. GEORGE WILSON and Major RICHARD BUTLER. After the Lt. Regiment was recruited it assembled at Kittanning. By order of Congress the Regiment was ordered to join the Continental Army in New Jersey. The Regiment left Kittanning 6 Jan 1777, marched over the mountains without tents or proper clothing and arrived at Quibbletown (now New Market) NJ six weeks later. Many died of exposure and disease including Cols. MacKAY and WILSON.

where THOMAS Regiment fought at Bound Brook, NJ The WILLIAMS was wounded in the leg, and at Woodbridge, NJ. Most of the Regiment as part of WAYNE's Division was at the battle of Brandywine, at Paoli and at Germantown. In July 1777 THOMAS was listed as a private (3 year enlistment) in Captain THOMAS COOK's Company, Col. DANIEL BRODHEAD. The Regiment encamped at Valley Forge in Dec 1777. or-It was dered to return to Fort Pitt but was diverted into the Wyoming Valley and West Branch Valley following the Wyoming Massacre. It finally moved to Fort Pitt and was with General McINTOSH on his probe down the Ohio River. The Regimenmt build Fort McIntosh at the mouth of Beaver Creek and helped Laurens on the Muskingum. In 1778 General Fort Brodhead assumed command but the Regiment was widely scattered on the It became part of the Brodhead Expedition against frontier. Indians to match General SULLIVAN's attack from the the east. The Regiment moved up the Allegheny River into western New York in 1779. On its return to Fort Pitt the original men were discharged as their enlistments ran out. THOMAS was discharged about Dec 1779 or Jan 1780.

In the file on THOMAS WILLIAMS in the National Ar-

chives, S 40698, is a receipt showing that THOMAS WILLIAMS and JOSEPH HANCOCK "going express to General Sullivan from Col. Brodhead, 9 Aug 1779."

THOMAS stated in his pension application in 1818 that his discharge papers were lost when he was captured by Indians on Dunkard Creek in 1782 on the Pennsylvania-Virginia border and carried to Detroit where he was delivered to a British Officer. The pension application was made in Cincinnati, Hamilton County, Ohio. It was granted (Certificate No. 13514) as of 3 Jun 1818 at \$8. per month. In this file is a deposition 14 Mar 1826 made to ISAAC G. BURNETT, Mayor of Cincinnati, by ENDS McILREY, that THOMAS WILLIAMS died intestate 25 Jan 1826. McILREY as administrator of his estate received the final pension payment of \$37.38. The Pension Roll of 1835 shows that THOMAS WILLIAMS received a total of \$733.91.

SARAH WILLIAMS died 10 Mar 1830 but we do not know where. There is no record that she even applied for a pen sion.

JOHANNES QUICK AND MARY GEORGE

JOHANNES QUICK was baptized 8 Oct 1749 at the Smithfield Church in the Pennsylvania portion of the Minisink area, the son of THOMAS QUICK and RACHEL EMMENS. He married MARY GEORGE about 1769. The 1790 and 1800 census indicates at least nine children were born to this union but we have identified only three by name. Others appearing in Mamakating Township in the 1790 census living near to JOHANNES (JOHN) QUICK were probably his sons.

JOHANNES or JOHN QUICK was badly wounded at Menga Creek when called out under Lt. DECKER of the Fourth Regiment of the Drange County Militia to repulse JOSEPH BRANDT, his Iriquois warriors and Tory soldiers in the fall of 1778. JOHN was a farmer in Mamakating Township of Ulster County but he served under Lt. MARTIN DECKER and Col. ALLISON with the Drange County Militia since his home was neared to their assembly point than that of the Ulster County Militia.

Mamakating is the southwest corner of Ulster County and like the western end of Drange County is in the Minisink area which includes the northwest corner of New Jersey and that part of Pennsylvania along the Delaware River and the Neversink River. Mamakating Township of Ulster County during the Revolutionary War was later divided into two townships: Lumberland and Mamakating. Thus JOHN is in Mamakating Township in the 1790 census and in Lumberland Township in the 1800 census, living only two doors from his son-in-law, THOMAS WILLIAMS, who married his daughter, MARIA QUICK, ca. 1795.

JOHN died between 1800 and 1810. He does not appear in the 1810 census and his two younger children, twins, were adopted by the EADS family and moved to Kentucky.

JOHANNES HECKENDORN, JR. AND CATHARINA CLEWELL

JOHANNES HECKENDORN, JR., farmer and miller, was born 23 Oct 1744 in York Township, York County, PA. He married 9 July 1771 in the Schoeneck Moravian Church, Northampton County, PA CATHARINA CLEWELL, daughter of FRANZ CLEWELL and SALOME KUECHLEIN, born 19 Oct 1748.

On 16 Mar 1775 JDHANNES (JOHN) purchased 198 acres and 151 perches of land in Windsor Township, York County, PA from HENRY LEPHART, miller, and BARBARA, his wife. This became the home plantation where JOHN farmed and operated a grist mill.

JOHN served as a Grand Juror in the July Session 1778 and as a Juror in the July Session 1775 Court of General Quarter Sessions. He was a private in the second class for Windsor Township 30 Jan 1781 and contributed to the requisition of a recruit for the army Jan 1781. He appears on the normal tax rolls for Windsor Township from 1779-1783. His inventory revealed that he held certificates for loans to the cause during the Revolution for 28 pounds 2 shillings nine pence and held Continental Currency in excess of 362 pounds. He was a recognized patriot and has been used as a supplemental patriotic ancestor by the author, NSSAR.

Following a severe attack of measles CATHARINA died 25 Oct 1789, age 41, and her husband stricken blind by the disease followed her in seven weeks on 14 Dec 1789. They were buried in the Moravian Cemetery in York, PA. "They both died blessed in the Lord and most of the children went to Lititz. They came from Hope in Jersey April 29, 1772, to stay here." JOHN died intestate. CHRISTIAN HECKENDORN, brother, and JOHN ROTHROCK were granted letters of administration to settle the estate , 21 Dec 1789. The Inventory was filed 25 April 1790 for 176 pounds. It was four pages long and showed the usual property of a farmer but the clothing of a well to do man and wife including the certificates for loans made to the government during the Revolution. The administrators made three reports: 4 Oct 1792, 26 Mar 1795 and the final report, 31 Aug 1799. The plantation and the mill were rented out during the years 1790-1795. The mill rented for 50 pounds per year. However, much of the expenses were for repairs to the mill. Upon the petition of JDHN, the oldest son, when he reached his majority, to the Orphans Court in December 1794 the real estate was turned over to him with the proviso to settle with his younger brothers and sisters (See Chapter 18).

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PETER PETERMAN AND DOROTHEA KAHN

The birth date of neither PETER nor his wife, DOROTHEA, have been identified. The first entry discovered is in a History of York County, PA for 1758, when Windsor Township was laid out. "Beginning at the plantation of PETER PETERMAN thence with the road to DAVID HUNTER's....along the middle ridge of hills to PETER PETERMAN's plantation and place of beginning; whence last described Township is to be called by the name of Windsor."

"At a Court of Special and Private Sessions of the Peace held at York for the County of York the twenty-fifth day of March....in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and seventy six the following persons were appointed by the Court to be Constables and Overseers of the Poor for the following Townships for the coming year: Overseers of the Poor for Windsor Township: GEORGE ALLIG and PETER PETER-MAN." The 1777 Quarter Sessions Docket Book was lost but we find an identical entry for 25 March 1778. This appointment by the Court is sufficient proof that PETER PETERMAN was recognized as a patriot by his peers during the Revolutionary War period.

PETER died intestate and letters of administration were issued to DOROTHEA PETERMAN and JACOB LEFEVER on 15 Oct 1778. The Inventory had a value of fifteen pounds four shillings and five pence. DOROTHEA prepared her will 12 May 1790. The will was proven 29 May 1790. PETER's estate had a value of 669 pounds, 5 shillings and 8 pence.

There were two ANNA MARIA PETERMANs at the same time in York County: ANNA MARIA PETERMAN, b. 16 May 1768, bpt. 12 Jun 1768, parents MICHAEL PETERMAN and ANNA MARIA PETERMAN sponsors, PETER and DOROTHEA PETERMAN; and ANNA MARIA PETER-MAN, b. 10 Oct 1765, bpt. 26 Nov 1765, parents PETER PETER-MAN and DOROTHEA, sponsors: JACOB BARR and wife. To prove that the mother of NATHANIEL HECKENDORN and ELIZABETH HECKE-NDORN was the ANNA MARIA PETERMAN born to PETER and DOROTHEA PETERMAN it was necessary to use the sponsors at the baptism of NATHANIEL, JOHN STAB and wife, BARBARA (nee PETERMAN) and for ELIZABETH the proxy sponsor was BARBARA (nee PETERMAN) The proof follows: On 1 Sep 1754 MARIA BARBARA PETER-STAB. MAN, was baptized, the daughter of PETER PETERMAN and DOROT-HEA with GEORGE MICHAEL KAN and MARIA BARBARA KAN as spon-JOHANNES STAAB married MARIA BARBARA PETERMAN 17 Dec sors. 1782. JEREMIAH H. CHANDLER AND MARY (ARMITAGE) KENNEDY

We first encounter JEREMIAH and MARY (ARMITAGE) CANADY (KENNEDY) at their marriage in Swede's Church, Philadelphia PA, 18 Jun 1781.

MARY ARMITAGE was the daughter of Lt. JAMES ARMITAGE, Captain of several Privateers during the Revolutionary War, and SARAH TOBY (TOBEY). She was born 1755-1765 (based on the 1800 and 1810 census) in Philadelphia, PA. She married (John?) KENNEDY and had one son, JOHN KENNEDY, when she married CHANDLER. It is probable that her first husband was a seafaring man and may have been imprisoned or lost at sea. A JOHN KENNEDY from the Brig. Lexington was committed to Old Mill prison near Plymouth Dock (England) in the fall of 1777. A search of the International Genealogical Index at a LDS Branch Library revealed two items: (1) "JOHN KENNEDY. male, Christened, JOHN KENNEDY/MARY, 1779, Philadelphia, St. Joseph's." (2) The second item had duplicate information with a 1784 date instead of 1779.

The statement of THOMAS JOHNSTON CHANDLER, (see Chapter 19) that his father, JEREMIAH NELSON CHANDLER, was born in Norfolk, VA led to the discovery of a letter report from Lt. J. H. CHANDLER to his headquarters in Williamsburg, VA, viz., "March 21st 1781, Hampton Roads, Boat, Patriot at Newport News, Naval Recognizance, Lt. J. H. Chandler, Navy to the Comd Officer at Wmsburg, (Express)" "Sir,

This morning at 8 o'clock we left the Road. There was under Sowills Point five ships, two brigs, one Schooner, one Cutter. One Ship in the morning caim (sic) up in the Road, under English Colors: fiard (sic) a gun to Seward (sic), was answered by the fleet, with one gun and English Jack at fore top Gt Mthead. At the arrival of this ship there was a Sloop Dispatchd for Porsmith (sic). I believe them all to be Enemy, but from their Signuls (sic) I have Reasion (sic) to believe there is a french fleet in Sight or a reinforcement from New York. I shall keep the best look out and give the Earliest Intelligence.

> I have the Pleasure to subscribe myself your most Obt: Hble Sevt."

This letter of Lt. J. H. CHANDLER and the subsequent marriage of his widow in Norfolk confirmed our theory that JEREMIAH H. CHANDLER, like her father and possibly her other husbands, was a seafaring man. There is a very good possibility that his middle initial is "N" for Nelson and the translater mistook the "N" for an "H." In reality he may have been JEREMIAH NELSON CHANDLER, SR.

In "Virginia Marriage Records" we find MDSES INGRAHAM PEARCE (PIERCE) and Mrs. MARY CHANDLER, 5 Jul 1787, Norfolk, VA. Thus MARY, a widow again, takes her third husband. By 1790 she returned to Huntingdon County and Bedford County. PA. Here she received 400 acres in Huntingdon County, by Survey, 2 Sep 1793 as MARY CANADY. This is possibly for her first husbands services during the Revolutionary War. She was enumerated as MARY PAICE (sic) in the 1790 census two lines above her father, JAMES ARMITAGE. She was known as MARY PIERCE in her father's will, in the 1800 census schedule and in a deed in 1807 to GLONINGER for land in Warrior's Mark Township, Huntingdon County. About 1804 she purchased "Carrigans," 193 acres in Bedford Township. Bedford County and lived there until her death in the spring of (MOSES PIERCE, Brig. Satisfaction, prisoner Forten 1813. Prison 27 Jul 1778. Pardon for exchange 11 Dec 1779.)

"ONCE UPON A TIME"

A JEREMIAH NELSON CHANDLER was born 27 May 1752 in the Andover-Rowley, Massachusetts area, the son of WILLIAM CHAN-DLER and JANE NELSON. JEREMIAH of Andover married MARTHA PARKER of Bradford, MA, 22 Oct 1772 in Bradford, MA. They had two children: SARAH and SOLOMON NELSON CHANDLER (d. 1776 AE 2 months). JEREMIAH served as a private in Captain THOMAS MIGHILL'S Company of Minute Men at the Alarm of 19 April 1775 and served five days. He enlisted 23 April in the same company and served three Months and 15 days. He was reported wounded 17 Jun 1775. Neither of the very complete family genealogies: "DES-CENDANTS OF WILLIAM AND ANNIS CHANDLER, ROXBURY, MA, 1637" and "DESCENDANTS OF THOMAS NELSON AND JOAN, HIS WIFE," have any information of JEREMIAH or MARTHA or their daughter SARAH after the death of their son in 1776.

It is possible that JEREMIAH, a widower, returned to the sea and arrived in Philadelphia prior to the marriage of JEREMIAH CHANDLER and MARY CANADY (KENNEDY) in Swede's Church 18 Jun 1781. It is only a short distance to Norfolk, VA and service in the Virginia State Navy.

We have JEREMIAH NELSON CHANDLER born according to the various census schedules between 1781 and 1784 in Norfolk, VA. By 5 Jul 1787 his mother married MOSES INGRAHAM PIERCE but in Wingo we find a JEREMIAH NELSON CHANDLER marrying Mrs. SUSANNAH McDONALD on 2 May 1783, in Norfolk, VA. There were definitely two JEREMIAH NELSON CHANDLERs in Norfolk, VA in 1783.

MARY (ARMITAGE) KENNEDY CHANDLER PIERCE did not retain her husbands very long but it is possible that her second husband, JEREMIAH NELSON CHANDLER had three wives, i.e., (1) MARTHA PARKER, (2) MARY (ARMITAGE) KENNEDY and (3) SUSANNAH McDONALD.

THOMAS JOHNSTON, JR. AND MARY PATTON

THOMAS JOHNSTON, JR. lived one-half mile up the Frankstown Branch of the Juniata River from the present location of Alexandria, Huntingdon County, PA. It was Bedford County until 1787. THOMAS was there as early as 1770. He had extensive land holdings in this Township (now Porter) throughout his life. The family operated a public-house or tavern at this location until his death 3 Oct 1813. He was born 1 Aug 1753 and married MARY PATTON, daughter of JOHN PATTON and SUSANNA ALEXANDER of Conococheague, Peters Township, Cumberland (now Franklin) County, PA.

THDMAS served as 1st Lt., commissioned 1777, 6th Company, 3rd Battalion, Bedford County Militia throughour the war. He collected Depreciation Pay from Bedford County as a Captain. He was still a Captain in the Huntingdon County Militia in 1788 following the erection of Huntingdon County from Bedford County in 1787.

He willed one-hundred pounds to each of his two daughters, SARAH CHANDLER and MARY (MAREY) MARTIN. He gave all of his real estate to his three sons. ROBERT was still a minor.

BENJAMIN STEPHENS AND REBECCA CALDWELL

BENJAMIN STEPHENS, born about 1735 in England, embarked at Plymouth England about 1756. His ship was wrecked off the coast of Maryland. The passengers in small boats with BENJA-MIN hanging on the side of one boat finally made the shore. In 1758 he married REBECCA CALDWELL in Somerset County, MD.

He was a soldier in the French and Indian War and was present at the capitulation of Montreal in 1760. During the Revolutionary War BENJAMIN and four of his sons served in the same company. BENJAMIN also served as a Ranger on the Frontier from 1778-1783 for Bedford County, PA. His son THOMAS lost an arm in the war and never married. BENJAMIN died at his home in Bedford County in 1814.

JOSEPH PITMAN, father of BENJAMIN's daughter-in-law, SAMUEL's wife, and JOHN GRAHAM who married SAMUEL's daughter, REBECCA STEPHENS, served with BENJAMIN as Rangers on the Frontier for Bedford County.

BENJAMIN's sons moved west looking for better and cheaper land. BENJAMIN, JR. moved to Illinois. WILLIAM, RICHARD and eventually SAMUEL moved to Indiana.

JOSEPH PITMAN AND MIRIAM

JOSEPH PITMAN was born in New Jersey in 1753 and moved to Bedford County, PA before the Revolutionary War. He married MIRIAM about 1775. He served in the Bedford County Militia as a Ranger of the Frontier 1778-1783 and collected Depreciation Pay from Bedford County.

We find him in Bethel Township, Bedford County in 1789 and in the 1790 census in Bedford County with one son under 16 years and two females. He appears on the Tax Rolls for Wheatfield Township, Indiana County, PA in 1806 and 1807. According to the 1810 census MIRIAM is dead for he is listed with a woman 16-26 years, either a daughter or a second wife. He did marry again and moved to Nelson County, Kentucky where he raised a second family. His will dated 20 Jul 1821 was filed in Nelson County and proven 11 Jun 1827.

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JOHN MOORHEAD, SR. AND BARBARA FERGUS

JOHN MODRHEAD, SR. emigrated with his wife and some of his older children from Scotland and settled in the area near the Pennsylvania-Maryland border in what was Antrim Township, Lancaster County, PA in the early 1740's. He secured land patents from the Honorable Proprietaries about 1746-1750 and appears on the tax lists of 1751, His first wife and mother of his seven children was BARBARA, believed to be BARBARA FERGUS. JOHN in his old age married a second time, a young woman, CATHARINE, apparently without issue.

Cumberland County was created from Lancaster County in 1750. Antrim Township was subdivided in 1751 to create Guilford, Lurgan, Peters and Hamilton Townships, again in 1779 to create Washington Township and again in 1781 to form Montgomery Township. When Franklin County was created in 1784 from a portion of Cumberland County all seven of these Townships were in the area designated as Franklin County. Thus the home plantation of the JOHN MOORHEAD family ended in Washington Township, Franklin County and the family never moved.

JOHN in his will made specific grants to his four daughters: JEAN BLEAKNEY, HANNAH BONES, ANNE ELMS and SARAH NESBIT and to his sons: FERGUS and JAMES. He made a special gift to "my son JOHN's son, JAMES MOORHEAD," (112.1.1). This indicates that his son JOHN is dead. This land was sold by JOHN MOORHEAD (112.1.2) a second grandson and brother of JAMES, the recipient, as his only heir 29 Sep 1792. At this time JAMES is listed as being from Virginia. However, he apparently was living in one of the nine counties of Virginia which were included in the new state of Kentucky.

JOHN made special provisions for his second wife and if she were with child he gave detailed instructions for grants if the child were a son and different instructions if a daughter. His will was signed 21 August 1775 and proven for probate 20 Oct 1775.

Two of JOHN's sons served in the Cumberland County Militia during the Revolutionary War. JAMES MOORHEAD, SR. served in Captain WILLIAM FINDLEY's Company, 7th Company, 8th Battalion from Washington Township. FERGUS MOORHEAD served in Captain JOHN DRBISON's Company, 4th Company, 4th Battalion from Peters Township.

JOHN HICKOX I, son of SAMUEL HICKOX and ELIZABETH PLUMB was born at Waterbury, CT 18 Nov 1696 and baptized at Milford 20 Dec 1696. He died 14 Feb 1765 and was buried in the Episcopal Cemetery in Bristol, CT. He married 18 Nov 1719, MARY (MARAH) GAYLORD, the daughter of JOSEPH and MARY (HIC-KOK) GAYLORD of Durham, Ct, his second cousin.

DR. BENJAMIN WARNER AND JUHANNA STRONG

BENJAMIN WARNER, the oldest son of Dr. EPHRAIM WARNER and ESTHER RICHARDS was born 30 Sep 1698. He was accepted as a forty-pound proprietor 23 Dec 1715. He married JOHANNA STRONG, daughter of JOSIAH STRONG of Colchester, MA and JOHANNA GILLETT, 17 Mar 1719/20. He died Apr 1773, AE 75. She died 8 Apr 1785, AE 84.

He apparently lived in Waterbury, CT his entire life. Two of his daughters married cousins, both named JOHN HICKOX and both JOHN HICKOX families lived in Great Barrington, MA. A son DAVID WARNER, served as guardian for REUBEN HICKOX I after his father's death and his mother's marriage to THOMAS RICHARDSON.

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THOMAS QUICK AND RACHEL EMMENS

THOMAS QUICK was baptized 25 Aug 1717 in the Kingston Church (see birth records). He married RACHEL EMMENS, the oldest daughter of ELEANOR ROBESON, the widow of EDWARD ROBESON, of Oxford Township, Sussex County, NJ. THOMAS was the son of JOHANNES QUICK and BREGJEN MIDDAGH. He was a private in Captain Thomas Ellison's Co, Ulster County Militia 1738.

THOMAS QUICK of Greenwich, Sussex County, NJ, weaver, died intestate, and his widow RACHEL, was appointed administratrix 26 May 1761. The will of ELEANOR ROBESON, proven 24 Nov 1774 mentioned THOMAS QUICK's four children by RACHEL EMMENS and her grandson, JOHN QUICK. Her will would seem to indicate that RACHEL is dead.

JOHANNES HECKENDORN, SR. AND CATHARINA SCHEUBEL

JOHANNES HECKENDORN, SR., weaver and farmer, was born 5 Apr 1716 in Langenbruck, Switzerland. He came on the Princess Augusta with his parents. He took the Dath of Allegiance to King George II in Philadelphia, PA on 16 Sep 1736. He married CATHARINA SCHEUBEL 1 Nov 1739. She came to America in 1736. CATHARINA, the mother of his nine children, also 12 Aug 1768. Her funeral drew a crowd of six-hundred died persons and was the first adult burial in the Moravian Cemetery in York. JOHANNES then married 12 Oct 1769 BARBARA (SPILLER) HANTSCH, b. 30 Mar 1728. She, too, came to America in 1736. Her husband, JACOB HANTSCH, was killed by the Indians in 1756. JOHANNES raised her daughter, CATHARINA HANTSCH. as one of his own and favored her in his will with fifty pounds. JOHANNES and his family "lived on the Codorus" until they moved to Yorktown 31 Mar 1761, BARBARA died 1 Nov 1793 and she and JOHANNES are also buried in the Moravian Cemetery, York, PA

On 9 Sep 1761 JOHANNES took the Sacrament, became a naturalized citizen and was finally able to vote. On 31 Oct 1769 he was elected County Commissioner for York County for a three year term. JOHANNES helped his church in many ways. He secured two lots and conveyed them on 26 Aug 1756 to the Moravian Church on the corner of Water and Princess Streets. This became the site of their first church in Yorktown, PA.

have never found the list of the citizens of York We County who signed the 1777-78 Dath of Allegiance to the Commonwealth and Renounced Allegiance to King George, III. Dnly those who took the Dath or Affirmed the same could vote or make use of the Courts to secure justice. JOHANNES evide-ntly was one who signed. He served 13 Oct 1778 as Judge of Elections for "Representatives to serve York in the General Assembly of the Commonwealth, High Sherrif, Coroner, County Commissioners and Assessors." He, also, sued the "Estate of WILLIAM RANKIN which had been forfeited by his Attainer of Treason" to recover sixty pounds owed by RANKIN to the Moravian Church of Yorktown. JOHANNES received pay from the Quarter Master Department of York for serving as a horse farrier for the Army in Aug 1779. Because of these activities JOHANNES HECKENDORN, SR. is recognized by the Sons of the American Revolution as a Patriot and designated Supplemental Patriot Ancestor for the author.

FRANZ CLEWELL AND SALOME KUECHLEIN

He was born JOHANNES FRANZ CLAVEL but due to the usual practices in early Pennsylvania it finally became FRANZ CLEWELL, the progenitor of our family in America.

FRANZ was born 24 Sep 1720 in Auerbach, Baden-Durlach to French Hugeunot parents, FRANCOIS CLAVEL and LOUISE FRA-CHE. His mother remarried following the death of FRANCOIS within the year with JOHANNES G'FELLERN. G'FELLERN, LOUISE her two sons sailed on the "Billender Townshead" from and Amsterdam, Holland. G'FELLERN drowned on the trip, thus LOUISE and her two sons arrived in Philadelphia 3 Oct 1737. FRANZ and his brother, GEORGE, were placed as Redemptioneers to pay for their passage. FRANZ served a planter, Dr. HEIS-TER. After serving five years, in Sep 1744 he married SALOME KUECHLEIN who also and served as a Redemptioneer (See Chap-They purchased land in the Oley Hills of Berks ter 49). County. The next year he sold and moved with their first child, MAGDALIN, to land 1.5 miles north of Nazareth which he purchased, 167 acres, for 28 pounds one shilling, called, Indostan, from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

FRANZ was very religious and it was in his home the first services were held with a Moravian minister in this area. FRANZ died 24 Jan 1798 and was buried two days later in the Moravian Cemetery at Schoeneck which is 1.5 miles north of Nazareth. In his will written 20 Oct 1792 he was generous to his family.

SALOME moved to Nazareth and took rooms in the Sister's House with one of her daughters waiting on her. She died 18 May 1812 and is buried in the Moravian Cemetery at Nazareth.

WILLIAM CHANDLER was born 25 Jan 1732 in Andover, MA, the son of WILLIAM CHANDLER and ELIZABETH BLANCHARD. He married 11 Feb 1752 in Rowley, MA, JANE NELSON, born June 1732 in Rowley, the daughter of SOLOMON NELSON and MERCY CHAPLIN.

He was a sergeant in Captain BENJAMIN AMES Company of Minute Men in Col. JAMES FRYA's Regiment which marched to the Alarm 19 Apr 1775, service 7 days. He was also in Captain SAMUEL JOHNSON's Company of Col. JOHNSON's Regiment. He enlisted 17 Aug 1777 and was discharged 30 Nov 1777, service four months with the Northern Army. He died 7 Jun 1781 and she died 26 Jan 1806, AE 75.

CAPTAIN JAMES ARMITAGE AND SARAH TOBY

JAMES ARMITAGE born c. 1720 in Bristol Township, Philadelphia County, PA, the son of BENJAMIN ARMITAGE II and his wife ELIZABETH (possibly THOMAS). He was baptized in the Abington Presbyterian Church 21 Apr 1723. He married SARAH TOBY, 11 Jun 1746 in the First Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia, PA. They lived in South Dock Ward of Philadelphia. She was the mother of his five children.

JAMES obtained 100 acres of land in Bedford County by a survey dated 23 Jul 1776 and warrants for nearby acerage in 1785, 1786 and 1788. He settled on these lands at an early date on Warrior's Mark Run near where Huntingdon Furnace was built at a later date. The JAMES ARMITAGE grist mill was located at this site. This area later became Franklin Township, Huntingdon County, Pa.

JAMES was taxed as late as 1780 in Philadelphia County as a mariner. He was on the Supply Tax List in Bedford County in 1783 for 3 horses, 4 cattle and 4 sheep, 12s 3p. He was on the Tax List in Bedford County in 1784 for one house and three whites.

JAMES appears on the list of officers of the Navy as a Lieutenant. This is a composite of two lists, one prepared by the Navy Department in 1781 and the other by the Treasury Department in 1794. He commanded several Privateers, viz, 1776, Sloop "Chance," crew 25 and 6 guns; 1779, Brigantine "Sally," of 50 tons, 14 guns and crew 30; and in 1780 the Brigantine "James," with 6 guns and a crew of 30. Captain JAMES ARMITAGE in the "Chance" took the ship "William" as reported in the "Public Advertiser," London of 13 Jan 1777. Captain JAMES ARMITAGE filed 9 Oct 1776 in PA Admiralty Court against the prize ship "William" to secure his share of the prize by sale. JAMES in the "Chance" and Captain William Greenway in the "Congress" took the Brig "Britannia" but she was later recaptured by H.M.S. Orpheus Friday 1 Nov 1776.

After SARAH TOBEY died a.1783 he married ELIZABETH in Huntingdon County. James signed his will 25 Jul 1804 and it was proven 26 Jan 1805. ELIZABETH and JOSHUA LEWIS, JR. received Letters of Administration on this date. JAMES was very generous and provided well for his wife, ELIZABETH. The sons got their share outright but the daughters had only the use of their share while they lived. Their shares were to go to their children. JAMES died 19 Jan 1805 and ELIZABETH evidently died before 6 Jul 1807 since MARY (ARMITAGE) KENNEDY CHANDLER PIERCE and her two sons sold property which was only available to them after the death of the widow. JAMES is buried in the Graysville Cemetery in Spruce Creek Valley with a beautiful new stone which incorrectly reads; "Here lies the body of JAMES ARMITAGE departed this life 19 Jan 1804 age 84 years." This should read 1805 since he signed his will in Jul 1804 and it was proven 26 Jan 1805.

JOHN PATTON AND SUSANNA ALEXANDER

JOHN PATTON was born in Ulster County, Ireland and emigrated to America about 1700. He settled on Indian lands in 1754 with a license from the Penn Heirs, 200 acres, dated 20 July 1734. This is in what is now Peters Township, Franklin County on Conococheague Creek at a place called Pleasant Springs. At that time it was Lancaster County but in 1750 it became Cumberland County. JOHN PATTON's will was dated 16 July 1767 and proven 1 Oct 1767 in Carlisle, the County Seat of Cumberland County.

He married SUSANNA ALEXANDER, the widow of DAVID ALEXA-NDER. They had one son, WILLIAM, and one daughter, MARY. WILLIAM was commissioned a 3rd Lieutenant, 10 Oct 1776 and while serving with the 1st Pennsylvania Regiment of the Continental Line was killed in the Battle of Germantown, 7 Oct 1777. His will was probated in 1777. He left a wife, ELIZABETH MODRE PATTON, and four sons: JOHN, JOSEPH, JAMES and BENJAMIN.

MARY married THOMAS JOHNSTON, JR. and settled in Bedford, County on the Juniata River.

SAMUEL HICKOX II AND ELIZABETH PLUMB

SAMUEL HICKOX II, son of Sergeant SAMUEL HICKOX and HANNAH UPSON was born about 1668 probably in Farmington, CT and died at Waterbury, CT 3 Jun 1713 in the Great Sickness. ELIZABETH was born 1 Nov 1669, the daughter of JOHN and ELIZABETH (NORTON) PLUMB. JOHN was the son of ROBERT and MARY BALDWIN PLUMB of Milford, CT. ELIZABETH died 17 Oct 1749. They had ten children.

SAMUEL was probably the first settler of Naugatuck. He erected a fulling-mill on Fulling-Mill brook and his house was by the brook.

DR. EPHRAIM WARNER AND ESTHER RICHARDS

Dr. EPHRAIM WARNER was born in 1670, the son of JOHN WARNER, JR. He married ESTHER RICHARDS, b. 1673, the daughter of OBADIAH RICHARDS - Booth of Wat and HANNAH ANDREWS 16 Aug 1692. He died Aug 1752 in his 84th year. They had five children born in Waterbury, CT. All outlived their father except MARGARET and the first EPHRAIM. The estate was settled by agreement and later by probate. The inventory was only 14 pounds 19 shillings, most had been given to the children during his lifetime. Three additional children are mentioned in the probate records who were not previously mentioned: EBENEZER, EPHRAIM II, and ESTHER.

Dr. EPHRAIM was very actine in buying and selling real estate. His many transactions are described in detail by Bronson. After securing his forty-pound rights 18 March 1701 he removed to Woodbury. In April 1714, "The town (Waterbury) to encourage Dr. EPHRAIM WARNER to come and live with us granted him the use of the school land for three years, he to maintain the fences." The town also voted him 10 acres on condition that he remain four years. He probably was practicing medicine in Woodbury since he was called Dr. EPHRAIM as early as 1706. He did return to Waterbury and served as physician or practitioner. Another person was surgeon or "bonesetter."

He was townsman, school committee, town collector, Deputy to the General Court in 1717, 1719, 1720 and 1722. He was chosen Captain of the Trainband as early as 1722.

The marriage banns were registerd 29 Jul, both were residents of Minisink and were married there. Minisink Village is at the Junction of the Neversink and the Delaware Rivers. It was pillaged and burned by JOSEPH BRANDT and his followers. She was born 2 Apr 1699 and baptized 23 Apr 1699, the daughter of JOHANNES MIDDAGH who lived at one time in Machackemack (Port Jarvis), NY. His will, Marbletown, NY blacksmith, mentions, "BREECHIE, b. 2 Apr 1699, m. 20 Aug 1716 to JOHAN-NES KWIK."

JOHANNES HECKENDORN, ALTFATHER, AND MARGARETHA GORIEN

JOHANNES HECKENDORN, ALTFATHER, a linen weaver of Langenbruck, Switzerland, born 26 Jul 1685. He was the ninth child of DANIEL HECKENDORN and BARBARA JENNI who were married 27 Feb 1663 in Langenbruck, Switzerland. On 2 July 1711 JOHANNES married MARGARETHA GORIEN, born 27 May 1688 in Neuenbrunnen, Switzerland.

Conditions in Switzerland in the 1730's were not encouraging for any family trying to do better than make ends meet. These conditions are well described in "The Heckendorn-Heckathorn Family in America, 1736-1982" by Thodore A. Heckathorn. When JOHANNES decided to emigrate he had property worth 500 pounds. He paid the Ten-percent Tax and the Manumission Tax for himself and MARGARETHA, a total of seventy pounds. Thus leaving only 430 pounds to pay their way and establish the family in America. He, MARGARETHA and seven children ranging from JOHANNES, age 20 to HEINI, age 3 began their trip down the Rhine River early in 1736. In Rotterdam they boarded the "Princess Augusta," 220 tons, commanded by SAMUEL MERCHANT. Most children under five years of age failed to survive the trip. Little Heinrich, HEINI, died at sea but MARTIN, age six, and the others survived.

age 50; On 16 September 1736, "Hance Heckendon, Sr., Hance Heckendon, age 20; and Dannill Heckendon, age 16" qualified by signing the Dath of Allegiance to George II. Women, girls and boys under sixteen were not required to sign the Oath. JOHANNES bought a farm on the south bank of the Susquehanna River on Codorus Creek in York County where he raised his family. JOHANNES was raised in the Reformed Church but in America he became associated with the Moravian Church. He purchased land in North Carolina in the Moravian Settlement near what is now Winston-Salem. He planned to move to North Carolina but died 14 November 1749 and was buried on his farm. "MARGARETHA went from the neighborhood near Yorktown to Lebanon" about 1753. She died at Hebron in Lancaster County (now Lebanon County) PA 27 Dec 1754 and is buried in the Moravian Cemetery in Lebanon.

FRANCDIS CLAVEL AND LOUISE FRACHE

FRANCOIS CLAVEL was born about 1690 in Dauphine, Fran-He fled with his parents in the Revocation Period to ce. Auerbach, Baden. He married LOUISE FRACHE in Auerbach in 1718. FRANCOIS died in 1730 leaving a widow and two sons: JOHANNES FRANZ CLAVEL, age 10, and GEORGE CRAFT CLAVEL, age 4 years. The widow, LOUISE CLAVEL, nee FRACHE, was born in Geneva, Switzerland 5 Dec 1695 to French Hugeunot parents who were compelled to seek refuge under a protestant ruler. They were members of the Reformed Church. She married JOHAN-NES G'FELLERN, a native of Switzerland c. 1731/2. They had one daughter who died in infancy. They sailed for America on the "Billender Townshead" which anchored in the Delaware at Philadelphia 5 Oct 1737 from Amsterdam, Holland. G'FELLERN drowned at sea. She placed her sons as "Redemptioneers" to pay for their passage.

LOUISE (FRACHE) G'FELLERN married JOHANNES KUECHLE before 1750 but he died in 1756. She died 5 Oct 1767 and is buried at Schoeneck on the Moravian God's Acre under an impressive white marble slab.

JOHANNES KUECHLE

JOHANNES KUECHLE lived at Neureuth, Baden-Durlach where two and perhaps three of his daughters were born. We do not know the name of his wife nor the time of her death. He arrived at Philadelphia 31 Oct 1737 on the ship "William," JOHN CARTER, Master from Amsterdam, Holland. He took the Oath of Allegiance to King George II on this date. His three daughters: SALOME, ANNA MARIA and EVA ELIZABETH KUECHLEIN accompanied him. KUECHLEIN is the feminine german form of KUECHLE. He settled at Manatawney, Berks County, PA in the Oley Valley. SALOME and EVA ELIZABETH served as Redemptioneers and it is possible that he did too.

We do not know when JDHN KUECHLE left Manatawney to settle near Nazareth but in 1754 FRANZ CLEWELL, GEORGE CLEWELL, JOHN PETER STOUT, brother-in-law of the CLEWELL's and JDHN KUECHLE, father-in-law of the three, were already living near Nazareth and belonged to the Schoeneck Moravian Church.

The mother of the Clewells was LOUISE (FRACHE) CLEWELL G'FELLERN. She married JOHANNES KUECHLE before 1750 and he died in 1756. She was born Dec 1695 and died Oct 1767.

SOLOMON NELSON was born 15 Nov 1703 in Rowley, MA, the son of FRANCIS NELSON and MERCY RDY. He married MERCY CHAP-LIN 15 Mar 1725, the daughter of JEREMIAH CHAPLIN "one of the first settlers of West Parish of Rowley."

SOLOMON was a farmer and lived first in Mendon but returned to Rowley about 1732. On 6 May 1733, SOLOMON NELSON and MERCY, his wife, were admitted to the Second Church in Rowley, West Parish. He built a house and settled in the southwestern part of the Parish on the "three thousand acres," now Georgetown.

SERGEANT SAMUEL HICKOX AND HANNAH UPSON

Sergeant SAMUEL HICKOX, the son of the emigrant, WIL-LIAM HICKOCKS, was born about 1643 in Farmington, CT. He died at Waterbury, CT before 5 March 1694/5. He married about 1667 HANNAH UPSON, born about 1648 and lived until 1705. HANNAH was the daughter of THOMAS and ELIZABETH (FUL-LER) UPSON of Farmington. Her father, THOMAS, died in 1655.

Sergeant SAMUEL lived in Farmington in 1673. He moved to Waterbury where he was one of the original settlers about 1677. He was one of the assigners of the first Indian deeds and is named in all fence division and proprietors lists. "So far as appeared he never once halted in the work he had undertaken." He was Townsman in 1682. "He was one of the leading men of the settlement and died at his post at a critical time when men of the right stamp could be poorly spared." He was Sergeant of the Waterbury Trainband from its reorganization in 1686 until his death a. 5 Mar 1694/5 during King William's War.

JOHN WARNER, JR-

JOHN WARNER, JR. as related to his father was referred to as Senior in the Waterbury Records. There is little known about JOHN but he did return to Farmington soon after 1700 and called himself "of Farmington" in a deed in April 1703, and again in 1705/6, yet in his will dated Farmington, 27 Dec 1706 he refers to himself as "of Waterbury." He died soon after writing his will and his inventory taken in Mar 1706/7 listed personal property as 71 pounds and his real estate was given by his will, house and homestead in Waterbury, to his son JOHN. JOHN WARNER and SAMUEL BRONSON, sonin-law, were executors. He signed his will with a mark as did his brother THOMAS. Five children were named in his will but his son, THOMAS, is not mentioned.

JOHN served under Captain SAMUEL APPLETON in King Philip's War, 1675-6 and received a grant of land.

JOHN STRONG was born 1626 in England and came with his parents, Elder JOHN STRONG and MARGERY DEANE on "The Mary and John" in 1630. He married MARY CLARK, the daughter of the widow FRANCES CLARK, 2 NOV 1656. She had two children and died 28 April 1663. In 1664 he married ELIZABETH WARRI-NER. They had four children before she died 7 Jun 1684. He died 20 Feb 1697/8 in Windsor, CT. He was a tanner by trade.

MARY CLARK is not the daughter of JOSEPH CLARK. His daughter, MARY, b. 1638 married JOSEPH BIRD. The widow FRANCES CLARK married second 22 Mar 1638/9 THOMAS DEWEY of Westfield who died in Apr 1648; married third in Nov 1648 GEORGE PHELPS. She died 27 Sep 1690. By her first husband, Mr. CLARK, she had a daughter, MARY. By her second husband, THOMAS DEWEY, she had five children, and by her third husband she had three more children. JOHN STRONG, JR. called JOSIAH DEWEY and THOMAS DEWEY "brothers" in deeds recorded 21 Sep 1663. These records identify his wife as the daughter of FRANCES CLARK.

THOMAS THEUNISSEN QUICK AND RYMERICK WESTVALL

THOMAS THEUNISSEN QUICK was baptized in the New Amsterdam Dutch Church 24 Apr 1644. The marriage banns were published 7 Dec 1672 in Kingston, Ulster County, NY. RYMERICK WESTVALL was born at Wildwyck (Kingston) the daughter of JURRIAEN WESTVALL VAN LUDERDORPST and MARIA HANSON, his wife.

THOMAS was a farmer, one of the earliest of the Dutch settlers in Ulster County, owner of considerable land and prominent in the development of that section. In 1686, THOMAS QUICK, was a Trooper in Captain HENRY BEEKMAN's Company at Kingston. THOMAS QUICK took the Oath of Allegiance to the English King in Ulster County 1 Sep 1689. He was commissioned Captain, 24 Dec 1689.

THOMAS died previous to 11 Oct 1698 when his widow, RYMERICK QUICK, signed a petition in the act of tresspass on land in Orange County. RYMERIG was living as late as 9 Nov 1716 when she signed a petition relative to her Minisink Patent.

In "Franklin's Pennsylvania Gazette" -- "ARMITAGE, BENJAMIN of Philadelphia County, old and feeble Friday night last missed his way in the dark and sank so deep in the mud and water in a meadow that he could not get out and was found dead."

MARY was born c. 1664 at Penistone, Yorkshire and died 16 Feb 1730. They are both buried in Abington, Presbyterian Church Cemetery under a tombstone that covers the entire grave. They immigrated in 1702.

WILLIAM HICKOCKS AND ELIZABETH

WILLIAM HICKOCKS, born c. 1608 in England, possibly in London, sailed from England 15 May 1635 on the "Plain Joan." He married ELIZABETH. Where he lived from 1635, when the Plain Joan landed her passengers, until he settled in Farmington is not known but they were first settlers of Farmington, CT. He died soon after, 1n 1645.

ELIZABETH married WILLIAM ADAMS who came from Massachusetts in 1648 and who died 18 Jul 1655. She died 3 Aug 1655. She had two children by HICKOCKS and two by ADAMS. When the inventory of ADAMS' estate was taken 6 Sep 1655, the two ADAMS children were listed along with SAMUEL HEACOCK, age 12, and JOSEPH HEACOCK, age 10. MR. STEELE and THOMAS JUDD were appointed to look after their interests. With whom the children lived until they were grown is not known but they lived in Farmington.

We are descendants from both SAMUEL and JDSEPH in that a grand-daughter of JDSEPH, MARY GAYLORD, married a grandson of SAMUEL, JDHN HICKOX. Generally the descendants of SAMUEL gradually began to use the HICKOX spelling and the descendants of JDSEPH favored the HICKOK spelling.



He was in Boston in 1637, an early settler of Hartford, CT 3 Jan 1639 and "received land by courtesy of the town with liberty to fetch wood and keep swine and cows by portion on the common." In 1640 he sold his Hartford lands and removed to Farmington where he was a first settler. He was an early member of the First Church. He married second, 23 Jan 1646/7, ELIZABETH FULLER. He died 19 Jul 1655. Inventory of his estate, 108 pounds 8 shillings. She married second EDMUND SCOTT of Farmington.

SYLVESTER BALDWIN, his wife, SARAH, and five children sailed on the "Martin." SYLVESTER died 21 Jan 1638 at sea. The widow and children arrived in New England. SARAH died in 1669.

ROBERT died 12 May 1655 in Milford, CT. MARY married 16 Mar 1676 WILLIAM EAST. East died in 1708 and she died in Milford 1 Feb 1707/8.

THE REVEREND JOHN NORTON AND DOROTHEA

JOHN NORTON, of Branford, CT is believed to have been the third son of RICHARD NORTON, of London, and ELLEN ROW-LEY, his wife. This remains to be proven. The name of JOHN NORTON appears on the first page of the Branford Town Records. He married first, DOROTHEA, who died in Branford 24 Jan 1652; married second, ELIZABETH, who died in Branford 6 Nov 1657; and third, c. 1658 ELIZABETH CLARK, who died in Farmington, CT about 1702. His name appears on the record as one of the eighty-four proprietors in the first division of land. He died in Farmington 5 Nov 1709. He removed from Branford to Farmington, CT about 1659.

WALTER GAYLORD was born c. 1622 in England (See Chapter 84) the son of WILLIAM and SARAH GAYLORD. He came with his parents on "The Mary and John" in 1630 to MA. He married MARY STEBBINS 22 Apr 1648 in Windsor, CT. She was the daughter of EDWARD STEBBINS and FRANCES (TOUGH) CHESTER SMITH. She died 29 Jun 1657. He married 22 Mar 1658 SARAH ROCKWELL (1638-1683). He gave 2 shillings 6 pence to the Connecticut Fund for Relief of Poor in other Colonies in 1676, His wife gave six shillings 3 pence in cloth and his son, ELEAZER, gave one shilling 6 pence in flax. He died in Windsor, CT 9 Aug 1689.

CAPTAIN JOHN STANLEY AND SARAH SCOTT

JOHN STANLEY was born Jan 1624 in England and came to England in 1634 with his father who died during the New voyage, leaving two children, JOHN and RUTH. Soon after his arrival in Massachusetts he was placed in charge of his uncle, THOMAS, with whom he came to Hartford in 1636, He married 5 Dec 1645, SARAH SCOTT, the daughter of THOMAS SCOTT and his wife, ANNA, of Hartford, CT. SARAH died 26 Jun 1661 and he married second, 20 Apr 1663, SARAH (STODDARD) FLETCHER of Milford. Soon after his first marriage he removed to Farmington, where he acquired considerable property. He was much respected and chosen to various offices of trust and honor. He was elected a Deputy to the General Court nearly every year from 1659 to 1696, was constable in 1654 and served on various committees appointed by the town or colony. He was also active in military matters, having been appointed Sergeant of the Farmington Trainband in 1664. Ensign in 1674, and Captain in 1691. He was, when guite young, on the expedition against the Pequots, and was also active in King Philip's War. During the later years of his life he generally received the title, Captain. He died 19 Dec 1706. SARAH died 15 May 1713.

JOHN WARNER, SR. was born in England in 1615 and immigrated to New England in 1635, on the "Increase." He was a proprietor of Hartford, CT in 1639 and here married ANN NORTON, the daughter of THOMAS NORTON, 28 Jun 1649. He settled at Farmington, CT in 1657, and was a patentee of Waterbury, CT in 1673. He died in 1679.

JOHN WARNER was one of the Pequot War soldiers and for his services had a grant of land, in 1671, from the General Court. Sergeant THOMAS JUDD and Sergeant JOHN STANLEY were appointed to lay out fifty acres for his heirs in Oct 1689.

ELDER JOHN STRONG-MARGERY DEANE-ABIGAIL FORD

JOHN STRONG married MARGERY DEANE, the daughter of WILLIAM DEANE. He came to America with his wife, two small children and his sister, ELEANOR, on "The Mary and John." He was the son of JOHN STRONG of CHARD who was buried in Chard 14 JUL 1613. The latter's will named a son, JOHN, and an unborn child, probably ELEANOR.

MARGERY is said to have died shortly after landing but the will of WILLIAM DEANE written in 1634 in England mentions his daughter, MARGERY, as though she were still living. JOHN was a brother-in-law of WALTER DEANE, the brother of MARGERY. WALTER also married ELEANOR STRONG the sister of JOHN STRONG. JOHN married second, ABIGAIL FORD, the daughter of THOMAS FORD of Windsor who also came on "The Mary and John" in 1630. She was born 8 Oct 1619, married c. 1635, and died 6 Jul 1688 (see Appendix, p. 248, for the THOMAS FORD FAMILY). MARGERY had two children and ABIGAIL had sixteen.

In 1635, JDHN was at Hingham, MA. He became a Freeman at Boston 9 Mar 1636. In 1638 he was living in Tauton and Representative in the General Court in 1641, 1643 and 1644. He removed to Windsor after 1644 and from there he moved to Northampton in 1659. He was a tanner and owned about twohundred acres around Northampton. Here he became the first ruling elder of the Northampton Church. He died 13 April 1699, AE 92.

WILLIAM WARRINER AND JOANNA SCANT

WILLIAM WARRINER came from England and was one of the first settlers of Springfield, MA. The Reverend WARRINER suggests that WILLIAM WARRINER, after the death of his first wife, left County Kent and after residing in Yorkshire for a score of years immigrated to New England in 1638. He is listed as a Freeman (able to vote) in Springfield 5 May 1638 and his marriage to JDANNA SCANT is recorded there. WILLIAM WARRINER and his son, JAMES, signed a petiton of the inhabitants of Springfield, MA in 1668 protesting the charging of duties on imports and exports of the colony.

In violation of a law made in 1640, WILLIAM WARRINER sold his cance to some party outside the "plantation," and was fined. In 1642 a second division of the plantation was made and "WILL" WARRINER as one of the "maryed psons" (sic) received a "lot 10 rod bredth." Those with the biggest families got "12 rod bredths." This venerable ancestor of all New England WARRINERS died in Springfield 2 Jun 1676. JOANNA died 7 Mar 1660. On 2 Oct 1661 he married ELIZABETH, widow of LUKE HITCHCOCK.

If there were more than three children there is no record of the fact. There is mention of the marriage of ELIZABETH WARRINER to JDHN STRONG in 1664. She was his second wife and died 7 Jun 1686 ten years after the death of WILLIAM WARRINER. She is not mentioned in the administration of his estate. She was baptized, and admitted into the Westfield Church Aug 1666. She may have been a daughter of WILLIAM by a second previous marriage in England but she should have appeared as his heir. She was hardly a sister since he was <u>old</u>, at least 84 years, at the date of her marriage. Savage suggests that her name may have been Warner. Where she fits in is difficult to ascertain since WILLIAM is reported to be the patriarch of all New England WARRINERS.

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JONATHAN GILLETT AND MARY DOLBERE

JONATHAN GILLETT was born in England, the son of the Reverend WILLIAM GILLETT of Chaffcombe, County Somerset, England. He and his brother NATHAN sailed on "The Mary and John" which landed in 1630. They settled Dorchester, MA. JONATHAN returned to England and married 29 Mar 1634 at Colyton, County Devon, MARY DOLBERE, b. 7 Jun 1607, daughter of RAWKEY and MARY (MITCHELL) DOLBERE. He came to New England a second time in Jun 1634 with his expectant bride.

He was made a Freeman in Dorchester 6 May 1635. He moved with the Dorchester Church to Windsor, CT. JONATHAN and MARY were privileged, having paid six shillings, to sit in the long seats of the church. He contributed to the fund for the aid of sufferers from the Indian War at Simsbury. He died 23 Aug 1677 and MARY died 5 Jan 1685.

MICHAEL TAINTOR AND ELIZABETH ROSE

MICHAEL TAINTOR was born c. 1625, the son of CHARLES TAINTOR who came from Wales. About 1653 MICHAEL was master of a vessel trading in Virginia. He settled in Branford, CT before 1650. He was one of the principal inhabitants of Branford and drew up the "New Plantation and Church Covenant." The original contains his signature and is reproduced in Roberts. His wife, ELIZABETH ROSE, born 1621, was the daughter of ROBERT and MARGERY ROSE. He died in Branford in 1673 and she in Jul 1659. His will written 22 Dec 1672 was proven 20 Mar 1673.

MICHAEL was a Deputy to the General Court or Assembly of Connecticut and Judge of a court at Branford. In 1669 he was one of a committee to settle boundary disputes between Branford and New Haven, and in 1670 to settle a dispute between Branford and Guilford.

THEUNIS THOMASZEN QUICK AND BELIJTGEN JACOBUS

THUENIS THOMASZEN QUICK and BELIJTGEN JACOBUS, both single, were married in Naarden, Holland 9 Mar 1625. THEUNIS THOMASZEN QUICK de Matzelaer van Naarden, as he sometimes signed his name, meaning the mason from Naarden, was first heard of in the early records of Nieuw Amsterdam when, with his wife Belitje they had their daughter HILLEGONDE baptized in the New Amsterdam Dutch Church, 25 Nov 1640. The baptism records of all their children except JACOB, presumably born in Holland, are in the New Amsterdam Church. WEYNTJE, the oldest, was baptized at Naarden 23 Jul 1628. It is believed that they came to America not long after the birth of WEY-NTJE.

This ancestor took a few fliers in down-town real estate in the heart of what has become the center of the financial and business district of New York City. There are many records of land bought and sold. Among early settlers on Whithall Street in 1645, THEUNIS THAMASZEN VAN NAARDEN was granted a lot on the present southeast corner of Whitehall and Marketfield Streets. This is the site of the Produce Exchange Building.

THEUNIS THOMASZEN being a mason by trade, undoubtedly had a hand in the construction of Old Trinity Church. His grandson, CORNELIUS QUICK, had a contract for supplying the stone. He was granted "Small Burgher Rights" 14 Apr 1657 and took the Dath of Allegiance to the King of England 22-26 Oct 1664 at New York.

This couple, the founders of the QUICK FAMILY in America had seven children.

WILLIAM GAYLORD AND SARAH

WILLIAM GAYLORD, was born c. 1582 and baptized 21 May 1582 at Pitminster, County Somerset, England. He was the son of JOHN GAYLORD who married JANE WALLEN, 1576. His wife's name is usually listed as SARAH. WILLIAM GAYLORD lived at Crewkernes, County Somerset from 1619 to 1624 and three sons were baptized there: SAMUEL, JOHN and JOSEPH. Where he lived before 1619 and from 1624 to 1630 is in doubt. In March 1630 WILLIAM, his wife, and five children: ELIZABETH, WILLIAM, WALTER, SAMUEL and JOHN embarked on "The Mary and John" at Plymouth as part of a group selected and collected by The Reverend JOHN WHITE of Dorchester, England. The passengers of "The Mary and John" were put ashore 30 May 1630 at Nantasket, later called Dorchester, MA.

WILLIAM GAYLORD was a Deacon of the Church and a signer of the first Dorchester land grants. He received his own land grant in 1633. He later was a member of the General Court and Selectman. He applied as a freeman 19 Oct 1630. He removed to Windsor, CT and was a Deputy to the General Court from that town where he died 20 Jul 1673, age 88. His wife died 20 Jan 1657.

DEACON EDWARD STEBBINS AND FRANCES (TOUGH) CHESTER SMITH

EDWARD STEBBINS came to New England from Braintree, County Essex, England in 1632. He was among the first to settle in Cambridge, MA. EDWARD was fifteenth on the list of names of inhabitants of "New Town" now Cambridge, 29 Mar 1632. He was a tanner by occupation.

The first record of his land is dated 5 Oct 1635 and consisted of seven pieces. (1) "Edward Stebings in the town, one house and garden with backside aboute halfe a roode Tymothy Stanly southwest, Walter Street northeast, Braintree Street northeast, Symon Brodstreet northwest." "Moore in Cowyard Rowe aboute one acker. Richard Goodman northwest, Cowyard Lane southwest, Daniel Patrike southeast, the Comon Pales northeast." The other five pieces contained respectively 3, 7, one, 3 and 9 acres each.

As early as 1636 he removed to Connecticut. He was one of the founders of Hartford. EDWARD STEBBINS' "proportion in the first division of land, dated 3 Jan 1639 was 24 ackers." "His homelot in 1639 extended from the Meeting House Square to Front Street, estimate 2 acers." He was Freeman of Massachusetts in 1634, constable 1638, Deputy to the General Court various times from 1639 to 1656. The exact date of his death is not known but probably occured in 1668. The inventory of his estate was 669 pounds 2 shillings. Deacon STEB-BINS granted in his will "forty pounds unto our beloved son, Mr. JOHN CHESTER."

His wife, FRANCES (TOUGH) CHESTER SMITH, was the daughter of RALPH TOUGH. Her previous husbands were: (1) SAMPSON CHESTER and (2) THOMAS SMITH. She died in 1673. Her will: "I give and bequeath into my dear and beloved son Mr. JOHN CHESTER now living in or near unto London in Old England the full and just som of twenty and four pounds sterling to be paid to him or his order within two full years after MY decease to be paid in wheat pease and pork in an equal proportion all of it good and mereganhoble at price current." "If God hav taken him out of this world before that tim then the legacy I have given to my son aforesaid I give unto his dear and loving wife and too his two sons JOHN and SAMPSON CHESTER to be divided amongst them in an equall and proportion." Her will dated 20 Nov 1670 and 12 Nov lust 1673. Her inventory 23 Dec 1673.

THOMAS SCOTT AND ANNA

THOMAS SCOTT, born 1594 in England, and his first wife, ELIZABETH, born 1594, embarked in Late April 1634 from Ipswich, England on the "Elizabeth." They were first settlers and original proprietors of Hartford, CT. THOMAS was killed accidently 6 Nov 1643 by JOHN EWE who was fined 5 pounds to the Colony and ten pounds to the widow. THOMAS had married second, ANNA. She was an early member of the First Church and married second THOMAS FORD, 7 Nov 1644. See Appendix p. 248, The Thomas Ford Family. He died 28 Nov 1676 and she died 5 May 1675 in Northampton, MA.

THOMAS NORTON AND GRACE WELLS

THOMAS NORTON came to Guilford with The Reverend Mr. WHITEFIELD in 1639. He signed the Plantation Covenant and served as the town miller until his death in 1648. Smyth reports that he was a church warden of Mr. WHITEFIELD's parish at Ockley, Surrey, England. Deacon L. M. NORTON identified him as the son, b. 1582, of WILLIAM NORTON and his second wife, DENNIS CHELMSBY. His home lot in Guilford, CT contained two acres and passed to his son JOHN on his death. It was occupied later by Lt. WILLIAM SEWARD, his sonin-law. He, also, owned seventeen and one-half acres of upland in Norton's Quarter, a parcel of four and one-half acres of marsh land by the sea. He married GRACE WELLS in Shelton Parish, Bedfordshire 5 May 1631.

WILLIAM DEANE

WILLIAM DEANE was the son of WALTER DEANE of South Chard, Somersetshire, England who died in 1591. The children of WILLIAM were: WILLIAM, ISAAC, THOMAS, SUSAN, ELEANDR, JOHN, WALTER and MARGERY. The younger sons, JOHN and WALTER, came to Boston in 1637, stayed a year at Dorchester and then settled Taunton, MA. From these two brothers have descended most of the DEANS now found in the United States. MARGERY DEANE married JOHN STRONG and came to America on "The Mary and John" in 1630.

The will of WILLIAM DEANE was probated in Oct 1634 and dated 22 Jul 1634. It is copied entire in Vol. 51, <u>New Eng.</u> <u>Hist.</u> and <u>Gen. Reg.</u>, pp. 432-3. The first three generations of descendants of JDHN and WALTER DEANE are given in full in Vol. 3 of the same journal, pp. 382-5.

ROBERT ROSE AND MARGERY

ROBERT ROSE, the Emigrant, came from Ipswich, England to America in 1634 on the "Francis" at age 40 (born c. 1594) with his wife, MARGERY, and eight children. He came to Wethersfield from Waterbury in 1635.

ROBERT was a soldier in the Pequot War, constable 1639-40, juror in 1641 and Deputy to the General Court 1641 to 1643. He removed to Branford as one of the first settlers in 1644 where he died in 1664 shortly after his second marriage. He married 7 June 1664 ELIZABETH of New Haven, CT, the widow of EDWARD PARKER and who had previously been the widow of JOHN POTTER. His will was dated 25 Aug 1664, proven in Branford 4 Apr 1665 and probated in New Haven 14 Dec 1666. She died at New Haven 28 Jul 1677.

WILLIAM CHANDLER AND ANNIS BAYFORD

WILLIAM CHANDLER, the Emigrant Ancestor, was baptized at Bishops-Storford, County Herts, England 12 Oct 1595. He married first, ALICE THOROGOOD 29 Jan 1621/2 of Farnham, County Essex, a parish near Bishops-Storford. She was buried 15 Jun 1625. He married, second, ANNIS BAYFDRD, sometimes listed as ANNIS or ANN ALCOCK, 6 Nov 1625. WILLIAM and ANNIS settled in Roxbury, MA in 1637. They brought with them four children. Their youngest, SARAH, is the only one with a birth recorded in this country. WILLIAM died 26 Feb 1641/2 at Roxbury, MA after a long illness of consumption. ANNIS married, second, JOHN DANE at Roxbury 6 Nov 1643. He petitioned the Court and received Chandler's house and lot. He stated that he had paid more of Chandler's debts then the house and lot were worth. He raised the Chandler children along with those of his previous marriage. He was buried 14 Sep 1658. She then married, third, 9 Aug 1660 Deacon JDHN PARMENTER of Sudbury and Roxbury, MA. She died 15 Mar 1683.

THOMAS NELSON AND JOAN DUMMER

THDMAS NELSON's family was one of twenty that emigrated with the Reverend EZEKIEL ROGERS from Rowley, Yorkshire, England to America in Dec 1638. They probably spent the winter in Salem. They removed in the spring to a place between Ipswich and Newbury which in Sep 1639 was named Rowley by the General Court.

He became a Freeman 23 May 1639, chosen Deputy to the General Court in 1640 and 1641. In 1643 he was chosen chairman of a committee to survey the town, lay out and register house lots. In Oct 1644 he was appointed to join in marriage persons in Rowley. In Jan 1644 the town granted him 36 acres in "the Mill Field," ten acres of which was to encourage him to build a mill. He built a grist mill and a saw mill on Mill River.

He made a will 24 Dec 1645 prior to his return to England on business. When he was about to return to New England he added a codicil in Aug 1648 because of poor health. He died 6 Aug 1648. He gave the mill and mill house to his beloved wife, JOAN. He married JOAN DUMMER, a daughter of THOMAS DUMMER and a niece of RICHARD DUMMER. JOAN was in England in 1654 with the younger children and mention is made that Mr. Nelson's children were in England in 1661-1662.

GODFREY ARMITAGE AND HIS ARMITAGE ANCESTORS

GODFREY ARMITAGE, son of JOHN ARMITAGE, by his wife, MARGARET BLACKBURN, was baptized in Kirkburton Parish Church, 4 Sep 1603 and died c. 1671. He married ANN a. 1632 in which year his eldest son, JOHN, was born. ANN was buried at Kirkburton 20 Apr 1670

GODFREY is described as the friend of OLIVER HEYWOODD, the ejected minister of Lydgate in Kirkburton Parish near Hucklersfield, West Riding, County York, England.

JOHN ARMITAGE, the father of GODFREY, of Lydgate, Woldale, Kirkburton Parish, was the second son of EDWARD ARMI-TAGE by his wife, ELIZABETH BORDLY. He was baptized 12 May 1566 and died c. 1620. His will dated 25 Nov 1619 was proven 1620-1622. He married MARGARET BLACKBURN 8 May 1586, baptized 15 Oct 1562. She died in 1624.

EDWARD ARMITAGE of Woldale, the father of the above JOHN was born about 1540, married ELIZABETH BORDLY who was buried 31 Mar 1585. He was the son of JOHN ARMITAGE of Honley in Yorkshire, England. JOHN wrote his will 10 Nov 1558 and it was probated 12 Apr 1559. The will directed that his body be buried in the Churchyard of Almondsbury and named his children. The compiler listed only her ancestor.

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APPENDIX

THE THOMAS FORD FAMILY

THDMAS FORD came on the "Mary and John" in 1630 to Dorchester, MA. He is not in the direct line of my ancestry but he is so closely related that the story of his interesting family deserves a place in this Appendix.

1. His daughter, ABIGAIL (1305.0Y), was the second wife of Elder JDHN STRONG (See Chapter 74), was the mother of sixteen of his children and the stepmother of my ancestor, JDHN STRONG, JR. (See Chapter 59).

2. THOMAS FORD married as his third wife, ANNA (ANNIE) SCOTT (2583.0), widow of THOMAS SCOTT (See Chapter 87), stepmother of his daughter, SARAH SCOTT (1291.0) who married JOHN STANLEY (1290.0), my ancestor (See Chapter 70).

THOMAS FORD of Dorset, England married first, 13 Dec 1610, JGAN WAYE who was buried 10 May 1615 after bearing one daughter, MARY. He married as his second wife, 16 Jun 1616, ELIZABETH (CHARD) COOKE, widow of AARON COOKE. She had one son, AARON, b. 1610. THOMAS and ELIZABETH had three daughters: JOAN, ABIGAIL and HEPZIBAH. ELIZABETH died 18 April 1643 and he married 7 Nov 1644 his third wife, ANNA (ANNIE) SCOTT, widow of THOMAS SCOTT. They are believed to be the parents of ANN FORD. ANNA SCOTT FORD, died 5 May 1675 and THOMAS FORD died 28 Nov 1676.

THOMAS became a freeman in 1631; was Deputy to the General Court from 1637-1640; a Grand Juror in 1645 and a Juror in 1644. He was a member of a committee to treat with Sachem Tehana for a piece of land in 1637 during the Pequot War. The land eventually became part of Windsor, CT. THOMAS removed to Northampton c. 1659.

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ADDENDUM TO CHAPTER 19

JEREMIAH NELSON CHANDLER AND SARAH JOHNSTON

A check of the ABRAHAM HAYS family in the 1840 census, PA, Allegheny County, 5th Ward, Pittsburgh; the HENRY HECKE-NDORN famiy in Brookville, Jefferson County; and the THOMAS J. CHANDLER family, Rochester, Beaver County failed to locate either a man or woman of the proper age to be designated JEREMIAH or SARAH JOHNSTON CHANDLER. However, in the 1840 census, PA, Brookville, Jefferson County, the previously unidentified woman, 15 to 20 years, is probably CATHERINE SUSAN CHANDLER living with her sister, HARRIET CHANDLER HECKENDORN and HENRY HECKENDORN. CATHERINE SUSAN married JAMES A. FULLERTON of Brookville about 1845-6. Thus we still have not located ELIZABETH CHANDLER or her parents.

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
